Memorial Day, May 30, 2022

Don Clark, 2nd Lieutenant, USMC, Retired (class of 1970), and President of the Isaac Litton Alumni Association, kicked off the program at 10:00 am. He read the names of each service man memorialized on the blue bricks in the Memorial Wall, along with a brief history. There were Litton graduates and coaches representing World War II, both in Europe and Asia, as well as from the Korean War and the Vietnam War. Some of the fallen were merely teens, age 18 or 19, when they heroically sacrificed their lives in the service of their country. Truly, they gave their all. Isaac Litton Alumni and Inglewood Community members gathered for the second annual Memorial Day Celebration at Isaac Litton Park. It was a beautiful morning; the American flag was flying at half-staff, and stars and stripes festooned the Memorial Wall.

A good crowd gathered, searching for shade during the beautiful sunny day. We were there to remember and celebrate the forty-one graduates of Isaac Litton High School plus two coaches who gave their lives while serving their country in the military.

When Don finished announcing all the names, Commander John McHenry, USN, retired, (class of 1970) together with Emily Benedict, a member of the Metro Council representing District 7, presented a beautiful wreath accompanied by a rendition of "Taps." Jay Dawson (class of 1965) honored us all by playing "Amazing Grace" on the bagpipes. It was truly a moving ceremony.



Hal Gibbs, Class of '71, brought a tent displaying information about the organization, "Flags Across America."

When the ceremony was over, most of the participants lingered either outside or in Lions Hall to visit, tour the Memorabilia Room, purchase Litton souvenirs, reminisce, and sample the refreshments.



This year, the ILAA Board of Directors has selected Larry Collier, class of '69.

The presentation of his award was made by last year's Alumnus of the Year, his big brother, Mickey Collier, class of '65. Here are Mickey's remarks.



Larry was a member of some very good Litton baseball teams. He was a drummer in the Marching 100+. In fact he assumed the coveted position of playing the timbales. In his senior year, he was elected Band King. His greatest accomplishment, however, was having the guts to start dating Mr. Swor's daughter, Sue, who was the band queen that year. That must have been some half time kiss because they have now been married 49 years.

Larry received his Bachelors degree from MTSU and Masters degree from UT Nashville.

He began teaching in 1973 at Haynes Middle School, followed by assignments at Cumberland Elementary and Brick Church Middle School. He was appointed Assistant Principal at Shwab Elementary. After that, he was appointed principal at John Early Middle School. He then was promoted to a Central Office position as Coordinator of student assignment. He was then promoted to the position of Director of Zoning from which he retired.

Larry was also a long time TSSAA basketball official in Middle Tn. One night he called me to say, "It finally happened. A guy in the crowd yelled, "Get In The Game Chrome Dome."

Larry played drums for about 15 years with other Litton grads with The Howard Fine Band. They played gigs all over the area. The annual Bash at Old Hickory Country Club was the big blow out of the year. They always drew a big crowd.

Larry served early on as ILAA president and secretary at the same time. He was given special thanks for providing pictures and stories for the 2009 Images Of America Nashville's Inglewood book.

He contributes interesting articles for the Blast several times per year.

Larry and Sue live in the Vineyards of Twelve Stones where he serves on the HOA BOD. They have two great kids and seven grandchildren. Family gatherings are loud and funny.



SPOTLIGHT ON ALUMNUS:

JAY McDONALD, CLASS OF 1964

While a student at Isaac Litton, Jay distinguished himself in every area of achievement – with teachers as well as students, serving as a role model to many of us. He was President of the Student Body and a Student Council representative; he excelled on the athletic field in Football, Track, and Baseball; he was a member of the Littonian Staff, Letterman’s Club, Southern Gentlemen, French Club, and Prom Committee. While at Litton, he also served as a Congressional Page in Washington, D.C.



In 1964, his graduation year, he was voted Mr. Litton & Most Outstanding and was selected as Litton’s representative for Youth Incorporated’s Great Smokey Mountain Leadership Tour, all while maintaining his status as an Honor Student.



Jay was married to Jani Gragg McDonald, also Class of 1964 and standout basketball star of the NIL Champions. Jani sadly passed away in 2015.



Jay has two children, a son Sean, a daughter Stacy, and one grandson, Mid.

After graduation from Litton, Jay graduated with honors from Georgia Tech, serving later as President of its national Alumni Association and as a Foundation Trustee. In February of this year, he was chosen as a winner of the Joseph Mayo Pettit Distinguished Service Award, the highest award conferred by the Georgia Tech Alumni Association, honoring alumni who have provided outstanding support of the Institute and Alumni Association throughout a lifetime and who have provided leadership in their chosen professions and local communities. In Georgia Tech’s history only 150 Alumnae out of over 200,000 have

received this award.

He received his MBA, with honors, from the Darden School of Business at the University of Virginia, where he was later chosen Distinguished Alumnus in 1982 and served for many years as an Alumni Board Trustee. His continuing educational and civic achievements are far too many to list here.

Jay's own words about his childhood: "Born in Germany to American parents, I moved to Tennessee with my pregnant Mother after my dad was killed in the crash of a military plane, he was piloting. Though I have no intention of ever "growing up," my childhood was largely spent in Nashville, Tennessee. We lived in an 800 square foot, two-bedroom, one-bath house with a narrow central hallway which accommodated exactly one person at a time. Until age fourteen, I shared a bedroom with my brother, Chris. Later, our one-car garage was converted to a bedroom with a bath, so I got to move into what seemed like a penthouse suite. Our family was middle class at best. We had our mother's love, attended church every time the doors opened, and never wanted for a thing. Born a couple of years after me, my brother Chris and I were partners in mischief and childhood in all we did and remain proudly connected today. We had the privilege of being raised in a community and an era where trust abounded in our part of the world. We safely played outside from daybreak until dark, without a care, coming home only for a bite to eat. We developed friends from all walks of life, played sports and pick-up street games in everything from traditional sports to kick-the-can and red rover. Creativity, learning to get along and to navigate the real world, and a sense of belonging were all part of our early lives. Common sense was learned out of necessity.


With a knack for organization, detail, and a tad on the geeky side, I mapped out my paper routes on index cards (yes, index cards) for each block of every street by drawing boxes for the houses/addresses receiving each paper and coloring coding them so my helper and I could deliver the correct paper to the right house. In the early morning darkness, things need to be simple but reliable. With this small business, I began absorbing both business and leadership principles."

His accomplishments have influenced and inspired many all over the world. And, throughout it all – he has remained loyal to Isaac Litton, always eager to lend his time and energy to any effort requiring his attention and never denies a request to contribute anytime he's needed. He has frequently been heard extoling the foundation he had at Isaac Litton.

In Jay's own words again, about his *TODAY*: "Other ways I try to give back: Give speeches throughout the country on leadership. Write blogs and articles on leadership. Try to lead by example. Mentor young students each year at Georgia Tech and the Darden School. Volunteer for the East Lake Foundation to raise money for underprivileged children and the First Tee. Been the only president of my Homeowners' Association since its inception. On committee for Atlanta Coaches vs. Cancer event in Atlanta. Have held leadership and board

positions in lots of non-profits and civic organizations that raised dollars and did good works throughout the community. I've always tried to be a giver not a taker. My "why" in life is to help others, especially leaders, to be their best possible selves."

Jay's most recent book is titled *Strategic Jaywalking: The Secret Sauce to Life and Leadership Excellence*. This sure-to-be-a-big-seller is about measuring risk and finding ways to think critically in pursuit of novel methods or solutions. It's designed to provoke thought about how we can become our best selves as humans and leaders. Drawing from Jay's observations, experiences, failures (yes), and successes across a varied career, it offers sage advice not just about what you should be thinking, but how.



Through vivid stories, it explores the qualities of exceptional humans and leaders, people like Jeff Bezos, Ted Turner, Albert Einstein, Steve Jobs, Martin Luther King, Jr., Mother Theresa, and Oprah Winfrey to name a few. Jaywalkers all. The book's take-aways are captured in compelling stories, throughout the short, succinct, topically organized chapters, then summarized into condensed, actionable summaries at each chapter's end, offering a road map for discovery.

Since his book was published, Jay has been heard on over 1,575 radio stations across the country! Not only has he been featured as an Serial Entrepreneur, Board Member, Keynote Speaker, Executive Leadership Coach and Thought Leader in big cities such as San Francisco, Philadelphia, Houston, Dallas, Denver, Seattle, Miami, Phoenix, Sacramento, San Diego, Tampa, Vegas, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Atlanta and Chicago - just to name a few! - but he's also gotten the seal of approval from major media brands, including Wharton Business Daily, SiriusXM Radio, Westwood One, iHeart Media, Audacy (Formerly Entercom/CBS - and this number will be higher after finishing his Fox tour later in June.

In March of 2022, we hosted a focus group meeting here with alumni groups from other area schools. Some, like us, Madison, Cohn and Goodlettsville, are no longer high schools. Others like Antioch and East are still High Schools. Frankly, they were amazed at our facility. And why not? The school has been closed longer than it was open. Opened for 40 years and closed over 50 years. We have the best website of any school, thanks to the active ILAA board and 1958 grad, Jerry Newman. All senior pictures with contact information, obits and now entire annuals are online.

Litton Middle School, under the leadership of Ms. Chara Rand and Ms. Pruitt are thriving. In fact, Ms. Rand was named Middle School Principal of the Year for all of Metro Schools.

The Inglewood community is thriving. Just price a home in this community! Inglewood Neighborhood Association meets here once per month.

Backfield In Motion

BIM used virtual learning labs last year, assuring that laptops were available for all the kids, with counselors and paid tutors making sure they did the work.

During this tutoring, you could hear a pin drop in this room. Everyone wearing masks.

Kids are well mannered and polite. It is heartwarming to see.

What does BIM do for us?

BIM is part of the reason we were able to get grants to restore this building.

They recently were winners of one of 100 grants awarded nationally by Lowes. They received \$100,000 and chose to spend it here.

They painted the exterior doors and railings. And painted the Lion Hall and rest rooms.

They recoated the gym floor and will have a new curtain made for the stage.

The ILAA paid to have the board room flooring replaced with wood.

We had a 70 inch tv installed with a PA system and ceiling speakers.

55 bags of mulch were distributed. We had the floor waxed.

The Lions Den memorabilia room is better than ever, beautifully displaying items donated as well as those found in yard and estate sales.

The Board has approved one more project: To restore the historic marquee in front of the school.

We are losing 15-18 Litton grads per month. How much time do we have left? It is hoped that this building will be used for the betterment of Inglewood youth long after we are all gone.

So I'm asking for your help to fund the sign renovation. It will cost about \$5,000 to repair and repaint.
