Alumni Gather on May 1 for Annual Dinner

JACK BENZ ENDS 2-YEAR PRESIDENCY; GEORGE COON TAKES THE HELM

More than 200 alumni, friends and special guests gathered at the Nashville Marriott on May 1 for the annual All-Class Alumni Dinner. President Jack Benz ('51) convened the group for dinner at 6:30 p.m. The invocation was delivered by Gene Ward ('51), followed by introduction of the banquet committee and Board of Directors of the Isaac Litton Alumni Association, Inc.

Johnny DuVal ('52) carried the reins as master of ceremonies for the evening's program. He introduced teachers who were in attendance and they included Lillian Long, Mary Virginia Gee, Frances Rice, Joyce Vardell, Doyle K. (Froggy) Smith, A.D. Hancock and Ronald Webb. He then recognized alumni from the classes represented. Classes represented in the decade of the 30's were 1933, 1937, 1938 and 1939. All classes of the 40's were represented as well as classes of the 50's. The decade of the 60's included 1960, 1961, 1962, 1963., 1964, 1967 and 1969. Bryan Roehrig attended for the second year in a row from 1971, the last class to graduate at Litton.

In addition the Golden Class of 1954 was recognized since they celebrated their 50th reunion this year.

A special surprise tribute was offered for Mrs. Long as she celebrates her 100th birthday in 2004. (See additional article in this issue). A giant birthday card and a dozen red roses were presented in honor of the event.

A traditional highlight of the evening has always been the reading of a rhyme, written and presented by Mrs. Gee. This year was no exception. You will find the rhyme elsewhere in this BLAST.

A somber part of the gala was the reading of our classmates who have passed away during the year between alumni dinners.

Benz then presented his President's report on the State of the Association, calling on Treasurer Graham Baker ('63) for his report. He then presented a special award to Paul Rawls ('51) for his work in establishing the complete mailing list and data base for the association. "Paul has put in long hours and exceptional effort in this endeavor," Benz related, "and we wish to thank him and recognize this achievement."

Walton Brown ('54), chairman of the nominating committee, presented the slate of nominees for officer and Board and the slate was accepted unanimously by the membership. Those serving your Association are listed at the bottom of this front page.

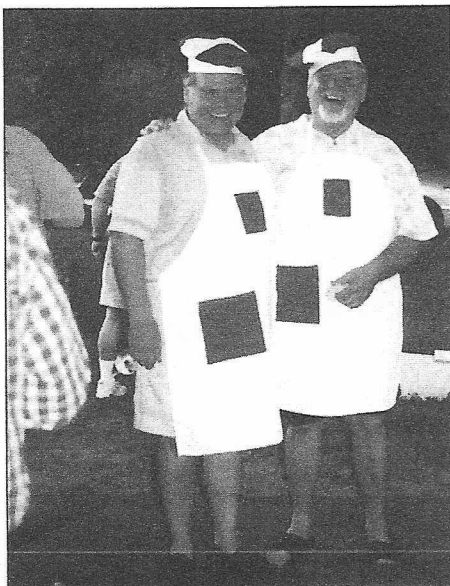
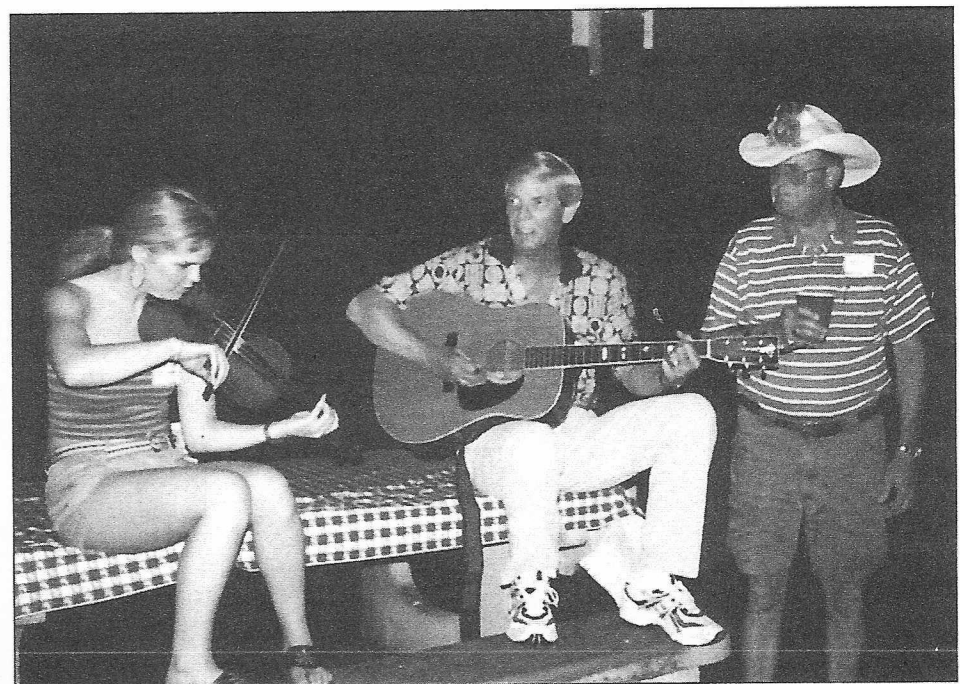

DESPITE SETBACKS, OLD GYM PROJECT STRUGGLES ALONG

To bring you up-to-date, the project to renovate the old gymnasium on Gallatin Road continues to move along, albeit at a snail's pace due to certain setbacks out of the control of the Alumni Association.

As you are aware, the association became a partner with the Metro Police Athletic League to renovate the athletic facilities at Litton to benefit the 2,500 'at-risk' children in the PAL program. The football field was modernized with new fencing, stands, sprinkler system, new turf, scoreboard, etc. at a cost of \$308,000. Hardaway Construction Company was primarily responsible for its completion – and the Alumni Association participated in the financing.

Jimmy Howell ('47), an association Board member, spearheaded the alumni

activities and has contributed long hours and exhausting effort in this endeavor. Last year, Metro Police Chief Emmett Turner retired and it was eight months before a permanent replacement was named. Due to budget restrictions and personnel shortages, the PAL program was dissolved, leaving these children and the Alumni Association 'out in left field.' A group of interested former coaches and parents organized "Youth Sports" for the 700 children involved in their basketball program. The Association is moving to assist in this program.

Howell (and other Board members) has met several times with Metro Council members, the mayor's representative, the neighborhood association and Board of Education members. In these meetings, it

was indicated that an agreement would be forthcoming between the Alumni Association and the Board of Education allowing the continuation of the project. As of this writing, that agreement is not in hand but is expected soon.

As a result of these developments, the Association had to return some \$266,000 that had been contributed by foundations, as well as respectfully decline approximately \$325,000 in anticipated grants. We do have \$70,000-plus in alumni funds being held for the project, funds accumulated through outright donations, sale of Litton memorabilia products and golf tournament proceeds. Hopefully, the worst of the delays is behind us.

We'll keep you posted. And a big "Litton High Forever" salute to Jimmy Howell.

ANNUAL ALUMNI PICNIC SET FOR AUGUST 21

The 17th annual Alumni picnic, a gala, informal get-together was held Saturday, August 21, 2004. Winingham Farms, owned by Judy-Joyner Maddux ('53) and Drew Maddux ('52), was once again the scene of the clambake. The daily work is handled locally by Board members Paul Rawls ('51) and Tom Pennington ('63).

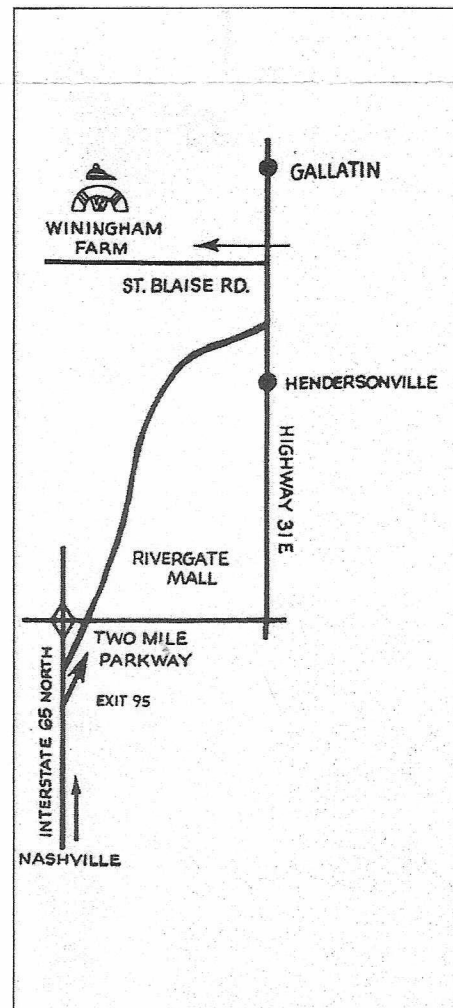

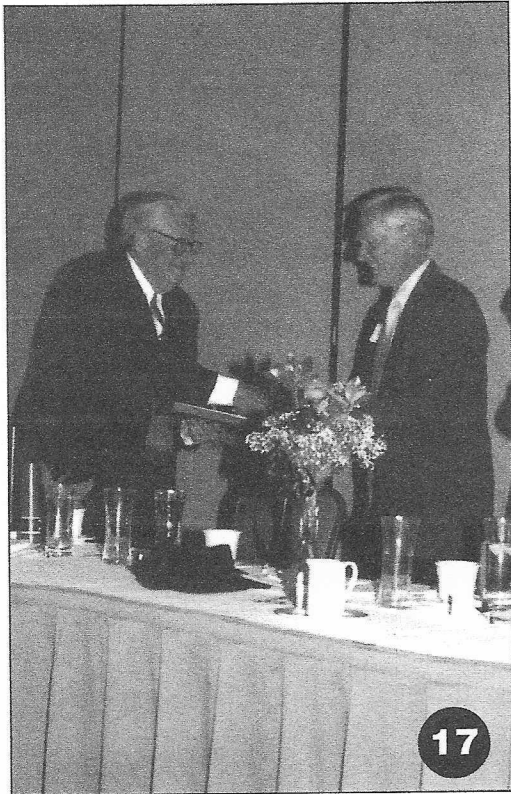

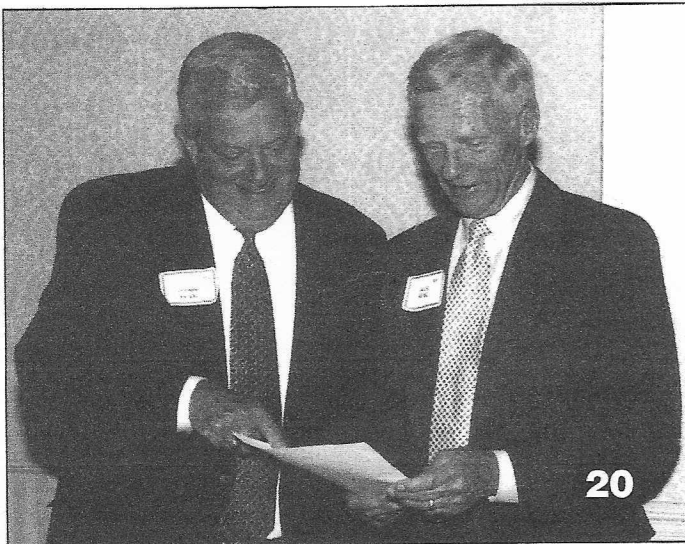

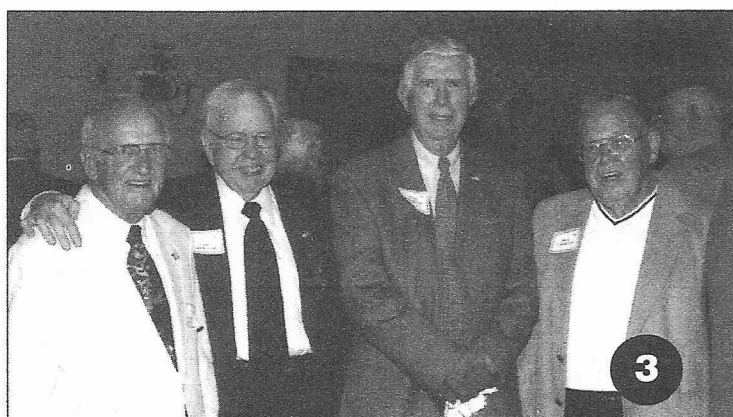

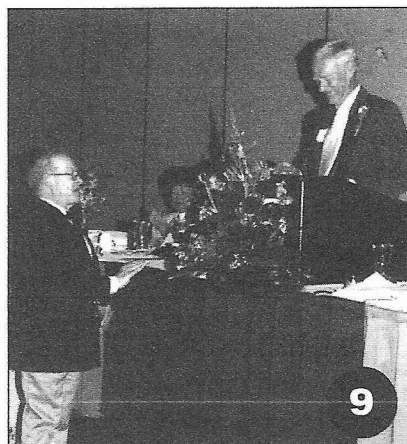

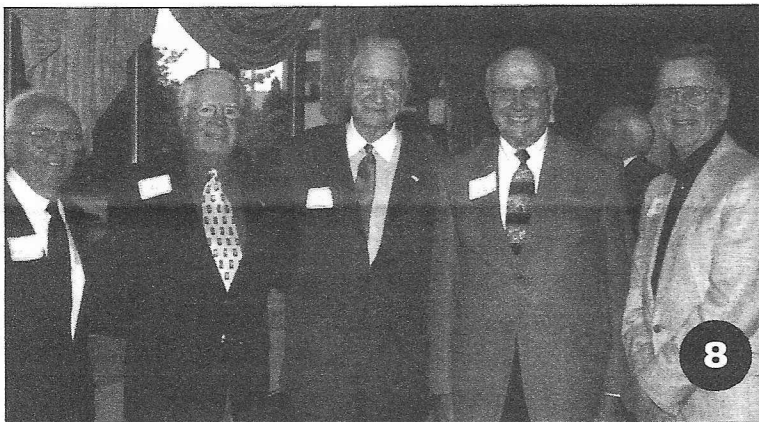

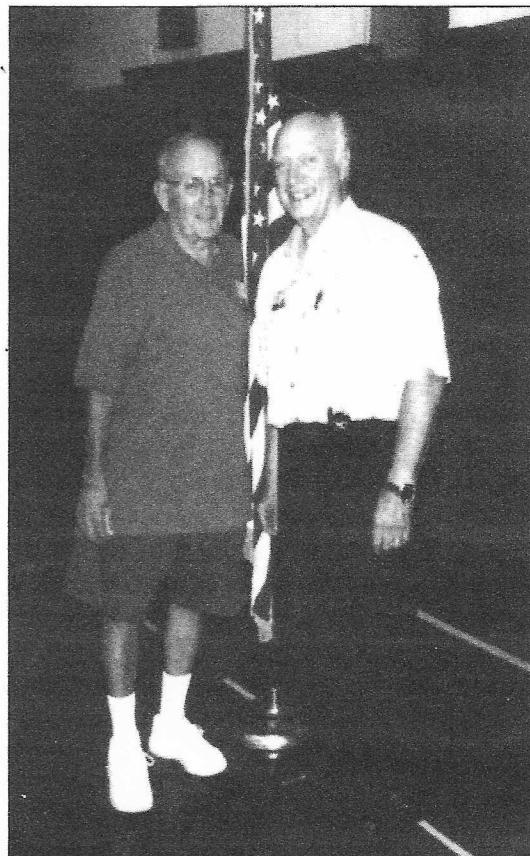

Mrs. Harvey Gee, with her always-appreciated rhyme, Justine Perry Duke ('44) and Coach Ronald Webb attended as special guests.

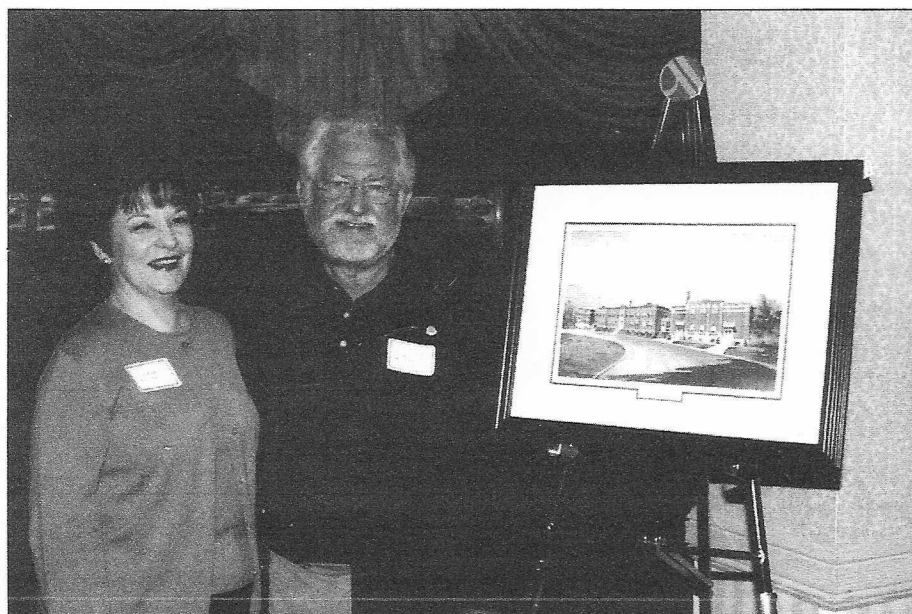

MRS. HARVEY GEE STILL 'RHYMES' AT ALUMNI GALA

Not allowing a fall to dampen her spirits, Mrs. Harvey Gee (pictured) presented her annual rhyme to the gathered alumni at the dinner on May 1. Having served on the very first faculty at Litton in 1930, she continued until the early sixties. To our knowledge, she has never missed an all-alumni dinner, as well as attending as many individual class

reunions as possible. This despite the fact she turned 99 years of age on July 3, 2004.

Few actual Litton alumni have fostered more dedication and emotional connection to the school as has Mrs. Gee. This is evidenced by the content of her rhymes, all somewhat different than the year before. For those who missed it, here's the 2004 edition:

At last came Graduation Day
You had to say goodbye
To the school you loved so much -
You now must learn to fly.

You've been through school with all your kids,
And maybe grandkids too,
But Litton High just ranks above
All other schools for you.

Now may Isaac Litton High School
A challenge always be
To the BOARD OF EDUCATION
To replace for all to see.

I'm really old and fragile now,
My energy's all spent,
But I am thankful for my mind
That helps keep me content.

I still can write these rhymes for you
And still my foot I swing
And always I along with you
Our Litton's Praises sing.

Now Johnny once described my rhymes
As "icing on the cake"
I always tried to make the best
"Rhymes icing" I could make
