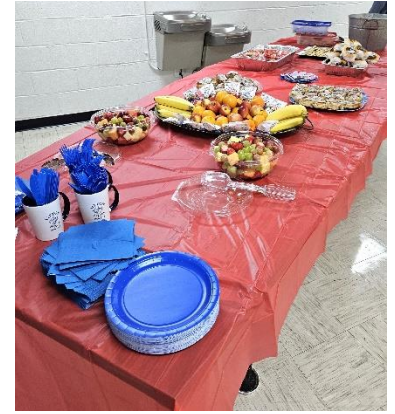

LITTON LION “EXPATS”

Do you remember the plans you had for the future after graduating from Litton? You were young and felt the world was your oyster. Some of you went right into the work field or got married or joined the military, while others enrolled in college or vocational school. The future looked bright, full of possibilities, as you set out on the journey of building the rest of your life.

Ever wondered how far away---literally---some of us ended up? Out of curiosity, this writer decided to check. This is what turned up.

Most alumni stayed and settled in the Middle Tennessee area (Nashville and suburban areas), while others relocated to eastern or western Tennessee towns (Knoxville, Memphis etc.). Quite a few chose Florida or Texas as their final destinations. A smaller number ended up in the northeastern or southeastern states: New York, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Virginia, North or South Carolina, etc. Some made the leap to the western or mid-western states: California, Washington, Oregon, Iowa, Idaho, Arizona, Colorado. A few even made it to Hawaii.

The real surprise I found, though, were those who left the United States altogether, to make their permanent homes abroad in France, Germany, Italy, the Philippines, Panama---even Australia. (Robert Joseph Tomlinson, class of 1955, settled in New South Wales, Australia, died and is buried there.) There are still Litton alumni living abroad today, from the classes of 1958, 1966, and 1967, to mention a few.

Who are/were they? One alumnus who responded to an inquiry is Stuart Byrom, class of 1967. He wrote, “When we retired in 2008, my wife, a lifelong Francophile, had always dreamed of living in France, so we moved and settled in Paris. We are having the time of our lives!” (Some of you may remember Stuart’s father, Isham Byrom, who taught English and Journalism at Litton.)

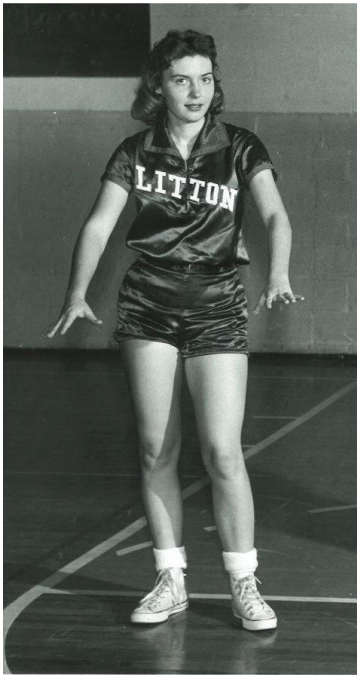

Rita graduated from U.T. Knoxville, in 1964 where she met and married Bill Mott from Goodlettsville. She earned a master's degree from George Peabody College. It is reported that Rita had a passion for education. She was a teacher, elementary school principal and Director of Curriculum for Williamson County Schools. This successful Litton graduate passed in 2014, at age 71.

Rita's brother, Milton, was also a Litton graduate, class of 1963 and was once married to majorette, Cathy Ford, also class of 1963.

It is noteworthy that Rita's daughter Sabrina Mott Mennen, who resides in Cincinnati Ohio, was also a basketball player. In fact, she was a member of the Lady Vols first National Championship in 1987, coached by the legendary Pat Summitt.
