

SPOTLIGHT ON ALUMNI

Barbara Jean Norman Haynes By Kaaren Frazier Andrews, Class of '59

Isaac Litton has had many sterling graduates, one of whom was **Barbara Jean Norman Haynes**, a 1955 graduate, who

went from Litton classrooms to rise to become the first woman to serve as a General Sessions Court Judge in Nashville.

Barbara was the first person in her family to go to college. She graduated in 1959 from the University of Tennessee, where she met and married the love of her life, Joe Mann Haynes. They had three children, two boys and a girl. When they returned to Nashville, Barbara attended and graduated at the top of her class from the Nashville School of Law in 1976. She joined her husband in a law firm in north Nashville and then in Goodlettsville where they made their home.



She was not only a daughter, wife, mother, and good cook, she was an avid reader and a lover of newspapers from everywhere, keeping up with all current events. She was a teacher, a researcher and a secretary to her husband when he started his law practice. After she herself obtained her law degree, she practiced for five years, working her way up to judgeship. She decided to run for General Sessions Court Judge and became an instigator and change maker, and she established herself with a flair all her own: she served wearing red robes, she smoked from the bench, always had flowers on the bench, and sang Christmas carols on the jail docket. In 1990 she ran unopposed for the Third Circuit Court Judge and served in that position from 1991 until she retired in 2011. She learned the intricate details of every case that came before her and she loved to mediate difficult cases

She was avid in mentoring other women and was most effective in her work in the first Leadership Nashville Class. She with several other female lawyers started the Lawyers Association for Women. Barbara also conducted the early Pencil Project adoptions from its inception so children could see a female judge in action. She was appointed by Governor Lamar Alexander to chair the first Tennessee Sentence Commission in rewriting the Tennessee Criminal Code. She served as Board Chair of Vanderbilt Children's Hospital, and she loved Pi Beta Phi's Christmas Village.

Barbara and Joe loved their three children and seven grandchildren, the Tennessee Vols, the Tennessee Titans, the Atlanta Braves, Jack Daniels, fishing, a roaring fire



and their lake house, a favorite spot. She also loved Diet Cokes, sourdough breads, feeding the birds, and taking home leftovers to feed to their dog, Buddy. She designed a special Christmas card and was always sure to send out get-well and special cards to friends and family.

Barbara passed away in January, 2022, leaving behind a great and lasting legacy to her family and the community. Isaac Litton is proud to have been at the beginning of that legacy.



Easter Traditions Around the World

Be careful where you walk in <u>Poland</u> on Śmigusdyngus (Easter Monday). You may be assailed with buckets, balloons, and pistols filled with water. Wear waterproof clothing or be prepared to get soaked. It's believed the tradition dates back to fertility rituals, but today the holiday is just an excuse for the young and young-at-heart to join in a country-wide water fight. The Polish community of Cleveland, <u>Ohio</u>, also celebrates <u>Dyngus Day</u> with food, polka music, beer, and an evening parade with a pierogi float.

The Easter Festival in Antigua, <u>Guatemala</u>, is the largest Easter celebration in the world. It's a weeklong celebration during which the community commemorates the passion and crucifixion of Jesus by conducting somber processional marches, carrying floats with large sculptures of Jesus and Mary. Sand and colored sawdust are painstakingly designed and laid in the streets in intricate patterns for the march to proceed over. On Easter Sunday, the city joyously celebrates the resurrection of Jesus with fireworks and the solemnity of the Lenten season is over.





More than 80 percent of the population of Greece belongs to the Eastern Orthodox Church. Accordingly, Easter holidays are sacred and celebrated with great devotion and fanfare, but differ in scope and tradition all over the country. On the island of Spetses, for example, fireworks are set off from churches all over the island to mark the turn of midnight on the night of the resurrection, as Easter Saturday turns to Easter Sunday. (Fireworks are a common way for Orthodox Christians to celebrate, especially in Greece, but they're usually set off on Easter Sunday.)

Then, in the afternoon, the people conduct the "Burning of Judas" in the main square in Kounoupitsa. On the island of Folegandros, the emphasis is on the Virgin Mary, and people clean and wash their homes in preparation for the passing of an icon of the Virgin Mary.

During <u>Semana</u> <u>Santa</u> ("Holy Week" in Spain, а variety of festivities and traditions take place in provinces all over the country. Perhaps the most elaborate, however, takes place in Andalusia, where the week leading up to Easter is alive with color, parades, and religious fervor. This fervor is most notably demonstrated in the somber processions; sometimes these are flanked by penitents dressed in long robes and tall, pointed hoods (symbol of religious penitence), and sometimes this means floats with statues and other depictions of



dramatic Biblical scenes, carried on the backs and shoulders of men and women of faith.



Easter festivities take place all over <u>Italy</u>, a country with deep religious roots and major historical significance in the Christian realm. Perhaps the most unique, however, takes place in Sicily. In San Biagio Platani, you'll find a tradition called *archi di pasqua* — the bread arches of Easter — in which the citizens decorate the town's main street with gigantic and elaborate archways, domes, bell towers, and other structures made of natural elements like breads, willow, fennel, asparagus, bay leaf, cereals, river reeds, rosemary, dates, and

more to mimic the feel of the inside of a cathedral. If carbs aren't your thing, you can celebrate a gluten-free Easter by attending mass at the <u>Vatican</u>, led by the Pope himself. Tickets are free, but you'll need to request them in advance (and pray you get approval)

Regardless of how you and your family celebrate Easter, whether you follow traditions listed in this article, or you have Easter Egg hunts, religious services, or family gatherings, we hope you have an Easter full of blessings and peace.

HOW ARE YOU CONNECTED TO "OLD GLORY"?

I visited Washington, D.C. last year, and one of the things I most wanted to see when I visited the Smithsonian Museum of American History was the American flag nicknamed "Old Glory," because of its local significance.

You probably know the concept of six degrees of separation, popularized by a book, movie, and parlor game, Six Degrees of Kevin Bacon. According to Wikipedia, "The game's name is a reference to 'six degrees of separation,' a concept which posits that any two people on Earth are six or fewer acquaintance links apart."

So where am I going with this? As former students at Litton, you and I have the distinct honor of being associated at some level with the flag, "Old Glory" and its original owner who is one of the most interesting people who ever lived (in my humble opinion). This person is William Driver (1803 – 1886).

Here is a short biography of Captain Driver from the <u>Tennessee Encyclopedia</u>:

Born March 17, 1803, in Salem, Massachusetts, William Driver is credited with nicknaming the American flag "Old Glory." At age thirteen Driver ran away from home to be a cabin boy on a large sailing ship. At twenty-one he qualified as a master mariner and was licensed to sail a ship. His mother and the "girls of Salem" sewed the flag which he hoisted on his first ship and christened "Old Glory." On an 1831 voyage to the South Pacific, Driver's ship was the sole surviving vessel of six that departed Salem the same day. He subsequently escorted sixty-five descendants of the Bounty survivors from Tahiti back to their home on Pitcairn Island and is said to have been convinced that God saved his ship for that purpose.

In 1837 Driver left the sea. His wife had died, and he moved with his three children to Nashville, where his two brothers lived. Driver remarried and fathered nine more children. Employed as a salesman for various Nashville businesses, he served as vestryman of Christ Episcopal Church. Every holiday, he displayed "Old Glory" outside his house by a rope extending from an upstairs room to a tree across the street.

During the Civil War Driver remained loyal to the Union and sewed "Old Glory" into a quilt for safekeeping. When the Union army occupied Nashville, Driver gave the flag to the troops to be flown for a short time over the State Capitol.

Driver died March 3, 1886; he is buried in the Nashville City Cemetery. At his request, his rescue of the Pitcairn people was inscribed on his grave marker (see below). "Old Glory" is exhibited at the Smithsonian Museum of American History in Washington, D.C.

According to his tombstone in the Nashville City Cemetery:

A Master Mariner Sailed twice around The World, once around Australia, Removed The Pitcairn people From sickness and Death in Tahieta To their own Island home Sept. 3, 1831. The 69 in number Now 1200 souls.

By all accounts, Captain Driver was a remarkable person, both as a patriot, as a citizen of Nashville, and as a world figure. So, what is our connection? He is the ancestor of several of our graduates surnamed Benz: the great-great-grandfather of Billy (1946) and Jack (1951) Benz; the great great grandfather-in-law of Peggy Benz (wife of Billy), and the great-great-grandfather of Billy and Peggy's children, Ned (1967), Bill (1970), and Gary (1972).

So, if you know Jack, Peggy, Ned, Bill, or Gary, or if you know anyone who does (and you most likely do), then you fall within the criteria of six degrees of separation between you and Captain Driver. I do not know about you, but I will bask in that "glory."

Jack Benz wrote a book, <u>Old Glory, from Salem to Nashville</u>, about his illustrious great grandfather. Again, in my humble opinion, this book is a must-read by anyone interested in American history, geography, sailing and navigation, and literature. It is very well-written and contains a wealth of knowledge.

If you would like to read more about Captain Driver, the January, 2018 issue of the BLAST has a more comprehensive biography of this amazing gentleman. You can access it on isaaclitton.com, in the Blast archives.




