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Dear Fellow Alumni,

This past year has really flown by; it's hard for me to believe that I am already starting my second year in this role. Since the last issue of the BLAST, we have celebrated two big events at our Lions Hall.

On Memorial Day, we came together to remember our fallen classmates—those who died while serving on active duty and who are represented by the blue bricks on our Memorial Wall. It was a picture-perfect day.

Then, on June 10, we had a great turnout at the Annual Luncheon—more than 150 in attendance. We elected Mickey Collier as President-Elect, so he will be taking the helm of this organization, once again, on July 1, 2024. We also celebrated Alice Shehane as Alumnus of the Year. The write-up about Alice is elsewhere in this issue of the BLAST. Jim Henry, class of 1955, blessed us with so many amusing and poignant stories about his time at Litton, as well as memories from his years as a pastor. All in all, it was a wonderful day. I hope you will all make plans to attend next year.

The following is an excerpt from my remarks at the Annual Luncheon. I've never considered myself a numbers person, but did some research with the help of Jerry Newman, who is our webmaster. Here's what I found: For the 40 years of our existence, nearly 7500 students have been listed as graduating from Isaac Litton High School. Of those students, there are roughly 650 that we don't have information on, so they could be living or deceased. Of the ones we know about, nearly 3500 have passed on, and 3300 are still alive. These numbers indicate we have passed the tipping point in our school's history, with fewer than half of our alumni who remain living. And of those, 285 are aged 90 or older including half-dozen who are 100 years or older. Even to the rest of us graduates, who by the way are all 70 or older, that seems rather old.

Now this was as of May 15, and you know that these numbers have changed since then, and they are only going in one direction, if you get my meaning. Those who have passed on, who are our beloved classmates, teammates, fellow jellybeans, boyfriends, girlfriends, moms, dads, brothers, sisters, and even husbands and wives—we celebrate

and honor and memorialize these precious relationships.

I say all this not to be a downer, but as a solemn reminder to each of us who remain and a challenge--to make the remainder of our lives count, a legacy if you will.

I want you to know that our board of directors is rising to that challenge and hoping to recruit each one of you and your able support, in three key ways:

- 1. Continuing to create ongoing memories and opportunities for fellowship among our alumni. This includes our focus on honoring our Veterans and remembering those of our number who died serving their country, as well as luncheons and reunions. We are even planning a Sock Hop for September 9! Help spread the word.
- 2. Continuing our support of Isaac Litton Middle School and Backfield in Motion. Your donations are used to recognize teachers and staff, supplement their activities, and provide needed supplies for students. So please continue to pay your dues and make donations as you are able, because this is how they are used.
- 3. We are also beginning the strategic planning process to memorialize and protect our legacy even after we are all gone. In fact, we have attracted the interest of the Tennessee State Museum and may have some neat news to share with you in the future. So please stay tuned and stay in touch with your ideas and suggestions. This is **your** Alumni Association.

We can only do this if we all work together. Thank you for being here; thank you for your financial support, and for your involvement. You are making a difference, and you should be very proud of not only your history and past accomplishments related to Isaac Litton, but also for being part of the ongoing work in this community.



ILAA Alumna of the Year

When an algebra teacher retires, how do they deal with the aftermath? This year's alumnus of the year is Alice Stewart Shehane, a long time Metro math teacher. She graduated in 1965. Alice was a member of the marching 100+, playing clarinet and oboe. During marching season, she was a four-year member of the color guard.



Her accomplishments at Litton were epic, National Honor Society, National Merit Scholarship Finalist, Junior Classical League Award, and selected "Most Intellectual" in the 1965 senior class. She also managed to win first place in the State Women's Club poetry contest.

She received her undergraduate degree from Peabody and served as the layout editor of the school paper there. She taught math at

Goodlettsville High School for 17 years. During summers at Goodlettsville, she attended MTSU and attained her master's degree. When that school in Goodlettsville closed, she taught another 17 years at Hunters Lane High School, retiring in 2003. She is a 50 -year member of Alpha Delta Kappa Sorority, which is an international honorary organization of women educators dedicated to educational excellence, altruism, and world understanding.

She and 1964 Litton graduate, Steve Shehane, were married for 43 years before Steve lost his battle with cancer in 2017. They have two children, Dr. Jeffery Shehane, a doctor in Hendersonville and Gallatin, and Michael Shehane of Knoxville. She has five grandchildren.

FYI: Alice's mother was also a teacher in the small town of Hendersonville, Tn, before the dam was built. A street there is named after her "Elnora." Her mother lived to the ripe old age of 103! Good genes.

Regarding her post graduate Litton involvement, Alice is the class representative for the class of 1965. She has been the committee leader for class reunions of 40 and 50 years for her class. Alice has served the Alumni Association in many ways. She is our current secretary and editor of the quarterly Blast. She serves as chairperson of the Communications Committee.

From Hugh LaFollette, Class of '66:

<u>Miss Mary Moss</u> was instrumental to my personal, intellectual, and professional development.

She loved history. She knew history was not a list of facts to recollect, but a narrative unfolding of our individual and collective lives. Society, art, and ideas shape and illuminate who and what we are. A sound, liberal education, with history at its core, empowers us to be more empathetic and cooperative, to live "richer," fuller, lives.



I will always be indebted to her for informing, inspiring, and challenging me. regret I never said that to her.

The following two listings are really special. The first is a posthumous recommendation, submitted by the son of one of our first graduates. The second is from the son.

From Herman Rippy, Class of '32, remembered by his son, Nolan.

My dad, Herman Rippy Sr., was in the first graduating class at Litton in 1932. I recall him speaking about Mr. Molly Malone of the faculty a few times. However, his favorite staff member, though not a teacher, was the principal, <u>Mr. James Brandon</u>, who was a graduate of The University of the South (Sewanee). Dad said that he and a good buddy, Paul Startup, also class of '32, used to ask Mr. Brandon from time to time to favor them with the alma mater of his college. Mr. Brandon

would gladly oblige and put on his best voice and sing it loudly as students would gather around him. Dad said this brought much joy to the students and more importantly it made the students realize that teachers (and principals) were regular people too.

From Nolan Rippy, class of 1969

Having so many wonderful teachers during my six years at Litton makes this a challenge but I will select one who not only taught the subject matter well but also taught me a teaching method that I have personally used for many years. I had the good fortune of having <u>Coach James Boyd</u> for American History and Civics/Government classes as well as my basketball coach for a couple of seasons. Coach would usually list a series of names, dates, places, terms, and events on the blackboard prior to class. He would then



take us through the lesson explaining meanings and details while connecting all these items together to make the material interesting and relative and easier to learn. He knew his history and he knew how to teach it. I have taught Sunday School classes for over 35 years using his method of instruction. My class members enjoy it and so do I. Thanks, Coach Boyd, you taught me more than you would ever realize.

From Alice Stewart Shehane, Class of '65.



Math was always my worst subject. I understood most of it but made careless mistakes. Then came Algebra I and II. Once again, not my favorites and the vagueness of it left me cold, although I did make decent grades. Then (cue angelic voices) came Geometry. Call me crazy, but it suddenly all made sense. In 1963, <u>Ms. Marilyn Wilson</u> and her Geometry class in the basement of the gym (where our alumni center is now) changed my life. I decided then and there that I wanted to become a math teacher. Here we are, 60 years later and I

taught everything from 8th grade math to AP Calculus for 34 years, 17 at Goodlettsville High School and 17 at Hunters Lane High. I wish I knew where Ms. Wilson is now so I could thank her for her inspiration. I've had many wonderful teachers, but she is the one who transformed the path of my life.

Some time ago, I received a care package of Litton documents from Jimmy Chappell, class of '59. Included in this package was the program for the Miss Nashville High school Beauty Contest. This event was held on February 7, 1959 at the Litton Gymnasium. The entertainment and door prizes are funny and interesting.

The Master of Ceremonies was Boyce Hawkins. One of the guest artists was Don Gibson. The Litton contestant was Patsy Borum, escorted by Jerry Parrish. There were 11 schools represented. 10 of the 11 no longer exist.

The Crown Bearer was little Joanie Smartt, a member of the '72 class that did not get to graduate from Litton. Little Joanie grew up to be a Litton cheerleader!

The #1 door prize was the following: A used car from Yates Ford, seat covers from Rayco, floor mats from Alvin's Auto Supply, five gallons of gas from Douglas Service station, a grease Job at Bink's Conoco, a paint job from Auto Paint Clinic, a battery from Hester and finally upholstery from Wright Upholstering Co. All of these were just a few of 23 prizes!

Other highlights were \$3.00 gift certificate to Cooper and Martin, one gallon of paint from Fremar's Hardware, a complete dinner for two at Litton Dairy Queen and a heavy duty tire tube from Tom Polk Tire Service! Wow! 1st ,2nd and 3rd place contestants were awarded a bevy of gifts including record albums, boxes of candy, pearl necklaces, shampoos and sets.

The title sponsors for the event were the Litton Blast and the Nashville Banner. I'm sure that a good time was had by all. Does anyone know who was named Miss Nashville High School that year?
