## The Perry Family and Litton High School

As Told by Mary Louise Perry Grissom ('42)

This is a story about a unique Family. The A. D. Perry family claims to have the most members of the one family to have graduated from Isaac Litton High School. Here is their story.

Mr. and Mrs. Perry had 7 children and 4 grandchildren, all of whom graduated from Litton. Not only that, they were very active in school affairs such as the Men's Club, PTA, and Band Boosters while missing very few sporting events.

**Edwin** was the first to graduate in 1935. He was on the golf team. After graduation, he served as a medic in the army during World War II. He spent 3 years in the jungles of New Guinea in the South Pacific. Years later, he retired from the Tennessee National Guard.

**Evelyn** Perry graduated in 1940. She was in the National Honor Society while at Litton. Many years later, she retired from the Internal Revenue Service.

**Mary Louise** Perry played on the girls' basketball team and was the editor of the Blast in her senior year, which was 1942.

**Justine** Perry graduated in 1944. She was the manager of the girls' basketball team her senior year. After graduating, she became the secretary at Litton. She faithfully served under principals J K Brown and Marshall Foster. She always had a very special place in her heart for our beloved school.

**Bonnie** Perry graduated in 1951. She was quite a go-getter after graduation, having earned a PHD from the University of Tennessee after having 5 children.

**Kenneth** (Bub) Perry graduated in 1952. He served in the Navy and later worked for IBM until retirement.

**Nancy** graduated in 1954 and was the last sibling to graduate from Litton. She went on to Tennessee Tech and became a teacher. She began teaching at Cumberland High School and moved to Hendersonville High where she remained for over 30 years.

The next members of the Perry family to attend Litton were the grandchildren.

**Linda Grissom** (Mary Louise's daughter) graduated in 1966. She received a master's degree from Peabody and taught school in Nashville until she moved to Abilene, Texas. She continued her teaching career there until retirement.

**Donna** Perry (Edwin's daughter) also graduated in 1966. She has spent her career in real estate.

**Paul** Perry (Edwin's son) graduated in 1967. He attended Tennessee Tech following high school graduation.

He has been very successful in business in Georgia where he remains today.

Finally, **Sandra** Grissom (also Mary Louise's daughter) graduated in 1970. She was a proud member of the Marching 100+. She attended MTSU after graduation and became an LPN until retirement.

We thank Mary Louise Perry Grissom for this story. We tend to agree that the Perry family quite possibly provided more Litton graduates than any other family.

## Alison Hiller Inducted Into SIU Athletic Hall of Fame



Alison Hiller is the daughter of 1958 Litton graduate Donna Yeaman Hiller and Richard Hiller of Atlanta. Alison was inducted into Southern Illinois University Athletic Hall of Fame - Women's golf 1998-2002.

Hiller was a three-time All-MVC selection who finished in the Top 10 at the MVC Tournament all four years. She qualified for the U.S. Women's Golf Amateur Championship in 2000. Two years later, she became the first SIU golfer to qualify for the NCAA Regionals since 1978. She won five tournaments during her career and set the school record for career stroke average (77.94). She stands sixth in career rounds in the 70s (55), sixth in all-time low 18-hole score (69), and first in all-time low 54-hole scores (215).

After graduation, she served as an assistant coach under Diane Daugherty for the 2003-04 season.




# FACULTY FAVORITES

## Creating the Litton "Brand"

What was the genesis of Litton becoming a statewide brand? How did Litton become so well-known from the mountains in the east to the bluffs of the Mississippi in the west? For me, the creation of the Litton brand was attributed to 3 men. More specifically, I'm talking about Coach Bob Cummings, Coach Bill Harris and Sammy Swor. Since we have already discussed Mr. Swor in the previous edition of the Blast, we focus on Coach Cummings and Coach Harris now.

I've asked others about Coach Bob Cummings and Coach Bill Harris, both of whom led the Lions to greatness from 1947 through 1960. Jerry Kemp ('53) described Bob Cummings as a man who inspired his players to greater heights than the players thought possible. Cummings was low key, not a yeller or screamer. He cared for his players. He practiced his players hard, but he didn't motivate out of fear, humiliation or sarcasm. He could visualize the end result to his players so they could see the championship possibilities which lay before them. Kemp said he considered Cummings to be his second father. The lessons taught by Cummings have stayed with Kemp throughout his life. When Cummings' charges defeated top ranked Oak Ridge following the death of Kenneth Duke in 1952, sports writers and others across the state took notice. Incidentally, over 2,000 Litton fans travelled to Oak Ridge for that game. In the days before interstates, that's a remarkable statistic. Litton had made its presence known.

Coach Bill Harris followed Coach Cummings in 1953. Harris came to Litton from Goodlettsville. Don Filson ('61) described Coach Harris in almost the same manner as Kemp described Cummings. Harris was a quiet motivator, one for whom his players would run through a brick wall. Filson told an interesting story of how he (Filson) came to enroll at Litton. Filson's family lived in the zone for Goodlettsville High School. Filson's older brother by 8 years had played football for Coach Harris at Goodlettsville. When Coach Harris moved to Litton, the older Filson talked his parents into moving to the Litton zone so that Don could play for Coach Harris. Now that's respect and love for a coach! Just like Kemp said about Cummings, Filson said he considered Harris to be a second father. In Coach Harris' last year (1960), he led the mighty Lions to its only unbeaten, untied regular season. In that year, Litton was named by various wire services as state champs. In the Clinic Bowl game, the largest crowd ever to witness a high school football game in Tennessee showed up...over 28,000. Amazing!

It is fascinating to know that Cummings, Harris, and Swor could be lumped together with essentially the same personality traits, the same leadership qualities, and the same passion to get the job done. Apparently, each of them was the quiet type who commanded respect without demanding respect. They taught, encouraged, motivated, and repeatedly drilled their charges during practices which ensured excellence on game nights. Cummings took the Litton brand statewide. Harris continued the statewide brand through his stellar coaching career. Then, Swor took the Litton brand nationwide.

Think about it for a moment. Without Cummings, Harris and Swor, Litton could have been just another old high school long since closed down. With them, Litton became what we all know it was: a powerhouse to be reckoned with not only in Tennessee, but nationwide. To be sure, there were many teachers who also contributed much to the greatness that was Isaac Litton. However, when we talk about statewide or national recognition and awards, the powerful Litton brand so popular in its day was due largely to the efforts and accomplishments of these 3 awesome educators. Much of the pride and tradition that was Isaac Litton High School grew out of the accomplishments and achievements of these 3 great men. We were truly blessed. by Larry Collier ('69)

## Jill Hudson Green Posthumously Inducted Into Tennessee Radio Hall of Fame



For almost 35 years, Jill Hudson Green of Hendersonville worked tirelessly at the Tennessee Association of Broadcasters to help protect the federal licenses of every radio and television station in Tennessee. She was posthumously inducted into the Tennessee Radio Hall of Fame on Saturday. Her husband, Donnie, and daughters Amanda and Kerry accepted the award.

Green was a second generation broadcaster who began her career in the 1960s at WKDA in downtown Nashville where she learned all facets of the business from the front desk and as a traffic coordinator.

In 1976 she moved to a position with the Tennessee Association of Broadcasters, where she would work for the next thirty-five years.

She managed the association's Public Education Program, which was TAB's primary revenue source, getting airtime across the state for charities such as the American Red Cross, the Kidney Foundation, Operation Smile, Waterworks, National Guard and Coast Guard recruitment, according to the association's website. She also managed the association's educational, scholarship and internship opportunities for university students; tourist development and grass roots lobbying. She saw that training was provided for managers, news personnel, advertising executives and engineers, in order to make stations more efficient and more valuable to their communities.

Jill was graduate of the class of 1963; She was Cheerleader all four years and Captain Senior Year; Student Council Vice President Senior Year; Homecoming Court Senior Year; Civitan-Civante all four years, among many other activities. Memories of her are of a constant smile, easy laughter, and loyal friendship. She died in 2011 at the age of 65.

## Pat Tomlinson Morrice (Class of 1959) With Guest Speaker Kevin Costner

I wish I could say Kevin Costner and I are "personal friends", but not so! I am a charter member of New Friends, New Life, a non-profit that began approximately 19 years ago. It started out helping sexually exploited women and their children. Kevin Costner was the keynote speaker at the New Friends New Life 12th Annual Wings Luncheon, with co-chair former First Lady Laura Bush. The annual luncheon, whose past speakers include Sally Field, Nichols Sparks and Barbara P. Bush, raises money to support victims of sex trafficking and commercial exploitation. It's going to be difficult to top this year's speaker, especially with his easy-going manner and interest in what NFNL is all about.



Kevin commented: "I didn't think this was going to be this big; this was supposed to be a little thing and I was going to talk to the guys from the NFL." Costner then turned his attention to the short film that opened the luncheon, which said New Friends New Life estimates that there are an estimated 400 teens are on the streets each night in Dallas....and this is happening all across America.

"These numbers are bothering people, the numbers bother me," he said. "And I can tell they bother the room...so we're kind of in this together. I have three daughters and I have told my children every day since the day they were born that they are special. But I never fail to end that sentence with 'that does not make you better than anybody.' "My daughters know what a man's hands feel like that love them, and some of these women have not been told they were special and had hands on them that love them so that they know the difference."

## TEACHER TRIBUTE

Mary Virginia King Gee



Academically, there were other teachers like Mary Virginia King Gee but she did so much more. She began at Litton when it opened in 1930, got special permission to stay on in 1937 when she married (old rules banned any but single women from the profession) and she retired 27 years later in 1957.

Mrs Gee's English and Latin classes weren't her only Litton contributions. She also sponsored forensics; the school paper, The Blast, from its inception; and the yearbook for 14 years.

In 2005, at age 99, she presented her annual poetry salute to the school at an annual dinner of former students. On February 4, 2007 at the age of 101 our Mrs Gee passed away at her home in Sumner County..

She was born July 3, 1905 in Rutherford County to Thomas Moore King and Delle Vaughan King. She attended school in Murfreesboro and graduated as an honor student from Central High School in 1923. Mrs. Gee received a B.A. degree cum laude from Vanderbilt University in 1927, where she was a member of Tri Delta Sorority. Later she received an M.A. degree from Peabody College. She taught in the Davidson County School System for 30 years, serving as Chairman of the English Department at Isaac Litton High School for 27 years.

In 1937 she married S. Harvey Gee, Jr. After retiring in 1957, Mrs. Gee served two terms as President of the Metro-Retired Teachers Association. She was instrumental in getting legislation passed in both the Metro Council and the State Legislature whereby the Retired Teachers were greatly benefited. Also, she did private tutoring and substituted at Montgomery Bell Academy. As a member of the Madison Circle of The King's Daughters, she helped to found The King's Daughters Day Home, a day care center in Madison. Mrs. Gee was treasurer of the day home for more than 20 years. For 20 years she served as Communion Steward at Belmont United Methodist Church to which she belonged. Mrs. Gee was a member of the Woman's Club of Nashville, the Ladies Hermitage Association, the United Methodist Women and the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

She moved to Gallatin in 1988 and transferred her church membership to the Gallatin First United Methodist Church. Mrs. Gee became active in the Clark Chapter of the U.D.C's there which is concerned with the restoration of Trousdale Place, the home of former Governor William Trousdale. She was preceded in death by her husband, S. Harvey Gee, Jr. in November 1991.

She is buried in the Spring Hill Cemetery on Gallatin Road near where Isaac Litton High School stood.
