SUCCESS STORY: WILLIAM WIGGINS

(Adapted from MNPS Achievers Publication)

Nashville Symphony timpanist William Wiggins' success story is a cheerful narrative intertwined with Metro Schools.

Wiggins is a Metro Nashville Public Schools alum. He was a student at Dan Mills Elementary School and went on to Litton, which at the time was a junior high school and high school. He graduated from Litton in 1964. He was also one of MNPS's own - a Metro Schools' teacher.

Wiggins taught 5th and 6th grades for the school district before he went permanently with the Nashville Symphony. His wife, Gay Hollins-Wiggins, is a MNPS music teacher at Westmeade Elementary School.

"Metro (Schools) has been a part of my life since I started school," said Wiggins, who is also an associate professor of percussion at Vanderbilt University's Blair School of Music.


"My mother was a highly respected principal at Julia Green; my younger sister spent her career teaching in Metro Schools," he added "We're all very involved in public education; we have a deep affection for Metro Schools."

Wiggins' mother taught him to play piano at an early age. Wiggins was a student at Dan Mills when John Kline, who at the time was the band teacher and also played for the Nashville Symphony, introduced Wiggins to drums. Wiggins took to the drums at Litton under the direction of Sammy Swor, band director extraordinaire and a revered figure.

Wiggins performed with the Isaac Litton High School Marching Band, which was selected to perform at the Tournament of Roses Pasadena, CA, in 1964. Wiggins called it a forming experience.

Wiggins went on to Peabody College and graduated with a degree in elementary education. Meanwhile, Wiggins, still a student at the time, was playing for the Nashville Symphony as needed and at other venues in 1967.

Soon after, Wiggins was teaching at Westmeade and later at Cora Howe. The symphony signed him to a contract in 1968. He was teaching with Metro while also playing with the Orchestra.

"I taught general classroom subjects and was the music specialist," he said. "I taught singing, vocals and a small group that performed."

After four years of teaching, Wiggins left Metro Schools to pursue music as a full-time career. He was appointed to the Principal Timpani position in 1969 when his teacher and mentor, Farrell Morris, left the Orchestra. Wiggins started teaching at the Blair School of Music in 1973, developing the undergraduate percussion program when the school merged with Vanderbilt.

"My plan was to return to Metro. I feel very fortunate to have been able to carve out a career in my hometown," he said. "It's not usual in the orchestra business to do that. I have been very fortunate and I am grateful."

Additionally, the Alumni Association is very proud of the recent designation by the American Red Cross to be a “mustering” location in the event of a community disaster. When the situation requires our neighborhood residents to evacuate their homes for any reason, the American Red Cross will set up a “command center” in our Lions Hall to serve the purpose of assigning these displaced community members to the appropriate facility to best assist them. (While they will not be housed or fed at our facility, the Red Cross has deemed this as a vital step in their ability to quickly help those in need.)

Of special focus for the ILAA is the participation in the BACKFIELD IN MOTION (BIM) PROGRAM. BIM is a nonprofit organization that combines academics and athletics to inspire inner-city boys to reach their maximum potential in order to become significant contributors to society. Funds provided by the ILAA are used to support tutorial programs offering academic remediation and homework assistance for these, Nashville’s most vulnerable youth. BIM, in partnership with the Isaac Litton Alumni Association provides a permanent facility to offer the classes at our Lions Hall, in the lower level of the gym.

And, in keeping with the Mission of the Alumni Association, our aim is to be a positive influence in the lives of ALL the children of our community by continuously reaching out to bring the alumni and community together.



TEACHER TRIBUTE

William Harold Gibson

William Harold Gibson is a native Nashvillian, born Dec 18, 1925. He lived within walking distance of downtown, so he and his buddies used to walk to movie theaters for Saturday matinee where they showed B Westerns. When he was seventeen he joined the Navy because his older friends were joining or being drafted into the Army. His dad, who was in WWI would not sign permission for him to join, so William forged his father's name. From the very first night that he arrived for training in San Diego he knew he had made a mistake! He served in the Pacific on the USS Minneapolis, a heavy destroyer.

When the war ended he returned home and went to college at MTSU, having finished high school studies in the Navy. After he graduated from MTSU, he taught a year in Ducktown TN. The next year he was employed by

Davidson County Schools, and taught 8th grade at Inglewood Elementary. When Litton Junior High opened in 1954, he moved there to teach for 6 years. Then he moved to Litton Senior High, teaching American History and Sociology. He says he and Mr Byrom used to walk around campus in the summers, and they could hardly wait for school to start back because they loved teaching so much. The parents were supportive of the school, and the students did what they were asked to do. Those were the days!

After teaching 6 years in the senior high, he transferred to the central office as an attendance teacher (truant officer) for 3 years. His favorite story about that was paying a visit to a family to see why their son was absent from school. The father said that he knew the son was in school that day, so Mr Gibson called up the school to tell them. While he was on the phone, the son, who had been hiding in the attic, came crashing through the ceiling. That ended the visit!

In the Fall of 1969 he went to Antioch High School as Assistant Principal, where he remained for 20 years until his retirement in 1989. Since then, he and Ellen have enjoyed traveling and watching baseball and news channels on TV.



William and Ellen have two daughters, Nancy, who lives with husband Patrick Miller in Clarksville, and Lisa, who lives with husband David Greene about three miles from Ellen and William. Nancy has two sons, Patrick, soon to be 18, and Connor, soon to be 12.

William also has a daughter Teresa and son Mark from a previous marriage. These children are not pictured.

Nominations: All graduates of ILHS are asked each year to nominate one (or more) persons who they think will meet at least one of the criteria above. This request (and the designated format on which to make nominations) will be presented to alumni through any or all means of communication available between the AYC and the alumni (email, USPS, the ILHS website, the BLAST publication, and/or class representatives). The AYC will close and review the nominations approximately two months prior to the annual Alumni Luncheon. The AYC will make their selection. Then it will be the duty of the AYC Chairperson to notify the winner in writing (as directed by the Communications Committee) that they were selected Alumnus of the Year.

The winner will be asked to designate someone to accept on their behalf should they be unable to attend. The AYC will proceed to have this name added to the award plaque listing past recipients (which will be on permanent display in the Board Room), and an award certificate will be prepared and presented to the winner to keep in his/her possession.

On the day of the Alumni Luncheon, the AYC Chairperson or Board President will announce the chosen Alumnus of the Year, at which time the recipient may make remarks of acceptance (if so desired), thank you, etc.

The winner will be encouraged to invite friends and family to attend to see them receive the award, thereby creating more revenue and excitement about and for the Alumni Association.

Kenneth Duke Inducted into Metro Schools Sports Hall of Fame

Legendary Litton Lion Kenneth Duke was inducted into the Metro Schools Sports Hall of Fame in the spring of 2014. Below is Duke's bio which was printed in the Hall of Fame program. He is considered to be perhaps the greatest football player to have ever played for the Big Blue.

Kenneth Duke Isaac Litton High School Class of 1949 *Posthumously*



Kenneth Duke was one of the city's greatest athletes during the 1940s. He played football, basketball and baseball at Isaac Litton High School. His outstanding feats on the gridiron convinced the football coaches of the NIL to select him as the Most Valuable Player in 1947. He was selected All-City by the Nashville Banner and the Tennessean in 1947 and 1948, All State, and to the All-Eastern Baseball team in 1949.

On Thanksgiving Day in 1947, in a rematch between MBA and Isaac Litton, Duke had one of his greatest games. Highlights of the game were a touchdown spree that saw three touchdowns in the space of 32 seconds. Duke rambled 18 yards for a touchdown that was answered by MBA's Billy J. Ehrhart returning the kickoff 90 yards for a six-pointer. Duke followed with an 80 yard kickoff return of his own. He scored on 18, 80 and 30 yard runs and gained 165 yards in 25 carries. That 1947 Thanksgiving Day game was so exciting that it gave way to the start of the Clinic Bowl in 1950.

Duke originally signed with the University of Tennessee, but changed to Southern Methodist University, where he played for one year. He joined the United States Marine Corps in

1950 when he was a sophomore. At the time of his enlistment, he was playing behind Kyle Rote (All – American and New York Giants). Duke played football for Camp Pendleton Marines in 1950 and was sent to Korea in 1952. He was killed in action Oct. 16, 1952.

The great sports writer Edgar Allen wrote of Sgt. Kenneth Duke, "he possessed a fire and determination and desire that must have made him an excellent fighting man in the Marines." Duke goes down as one of the greatest – if not the greatest – player in Litton's history. "Maybe we've had boys with more ability," said former Litton Coach Bob Cummings, "but one thing's certain, we've never had anyone with more determination." Upon receiving news of Duke's death, Coach Cummings immediately retired his #33 jersey worn in 1946, 1947 and 1948.

The Isaac Litton athletic and band building is named in his honor, as well as the Briley Parkway Bridge.

Bluegrass Country Club was born in 1949, when the original property was obtained by Genesco. Construction of the golf course began in earnest in 1952. Just one year later, in 1953, the Bluegrass Country Club officially opened.



In the spring of 1957, the J. Harlan Lawson Marina was opened. And in 1960, the Club moved from the original clubhouse to the new clubhouse on the North side of Gallatin Road.

The Sixties saw Bluegrass host the Music City Celebrity Golf Tournament, in which sports and entertainments of the day competed for charities in the annual two-day event. In 1986, construction of the new clubhouse (as it stands today) was undertaken and ultimately the marina was renovated.



By 2007, the clubhouse was completely remodeled from floor to ceiling, to become the ultimate in posh venues that it is today.

On Saturday, October 17, a reunion luncheon was held for all alumni of the Marching 100+. A crowd of 125 former band members gathered for an afternoon of wonderful memories and emotional surprises. Following the spaghetti lunch, the Litton Middle School Band presented a short concert for the group.

The biggest surprise was the unveiling of a much sought-after DVD which contained the national broadcast of a Marching 100+ halftime performance from 1965. The black and white footage was taken from the August 28 CBS telecast of an NFL preseason game between the Chicago Bears and the Los Angeles Rams at Vanderbilt.

As the telecast began with the band's entrance to Malaguena, cheers, tears and goose bumps filled the room. It was an emotional time as everyone witnessed a complete halftime show from the Marching 100+ for the first time since our beloved high school was closed in June, 1971.

CHRISTMAS REFLECTIONS OF AN OLD FIGHTER-ATTACK PILOT

Old fast movers only zoom and boom in their minds. Mostly they play golf, drink a lot better Scotch than in younger days, and when winter sets in, sit by the fire, scratch the dog, and remember when they were something else...



Last night, December 18th was the 43rd anniversary of the beginning of the eleven days of Christmas that ended the Vietnam mess... and so some "remembered sky."

In 2010 based on upcoming 100th year anniversary of Naval Aviation, I determined to go back and revisit my time and particularly the 11 months flying off of USS Midway due to the 30 March '72 North Vietnam Easter Offensive. In doing that I not only read, researched and talked to Navy buds but sought out Air Force guys from the Red River Valley Fighter Pilots - the Rats - like Ed Rasimus (RIP) and Bob Hipps to try and understand better the whole period air-war wise. Most know the story of the B-52s and their 15 loses over those 11 nights of Christmas. But Navy A-6 guys had some really tough times around Haiphong and were a much more significant part of the overall plan than most realize. For me an A-7B guy, I never launched, lots of sitting in the cockpit on SAR (rescue) alert. While we did a lot of night attack in those 11 months, the A-7B wasn't considered system wise up to going over the beach at night in that kind of brouhaha so only a few were launched. Echos from other carriers did.

I remember that night vividly. That night was one of those times when I was not sure we were coming back. But thanks to Snake, the best A6 pilot I have known, we evaded the defenses of Haiphong twice. Snake, you'll never be forgotten! Bob Koch, VA-115.

I won't belabor any further, but my conclusion was that if you were to look at the history of the Vietnam war as if we were responding only to the 30 March invasion, March '72 - March '73 when the POWs came home, you could conclude that the ARVN with US advisers and US airpower defeated the NVN totally. Gen Giap said that after Oct it would take 3-5 years to reconstitute for another invasion. (Minus post 73 US involvement it took 3)

History can't be re-written, war is politics, policy, politicians, flag officers and finally warfighters.

Many if not all - certainly historians - will never agree with me but IMHO, grouping Rolling Thunder (no criticism meant here to RT guys... they were forced to play by very different rules) with Linebacker I & II in an overall analysis of the use of air power in VN is a disservice not only to U.S. airpower application but also to those of us who fought a different battle in 1972-73 - much of our survival due to those RT guys who came back and taught us young'ns and therein saved our asses.

On our watch, we won. But young men don't decide wars. NVN's army was beaten and retreated, the POWs came home. Mission accomplished.
