Dr. Cleo Miller: They Needed Him

(The following article is taken in its entirety from the Nashville Banner June 30, 1971, just a couple of weeks after Litton was closed.)

In a day when the American family doctor is someone only grandmother remembers, Dr. Cleo Miller of Miller Hospital-Clinic on Gallatin Road rivals even the current television show doctors in popularity among the people to whom he has ministered for more than four decades.



Well known throughout the state and claimed as their own by most Nashvillians east of the Cumberland River, Dr. Miller officially retired this month as head of the hospital and clinic which he founded, along with three other doctors in 1935.

“We have tried to kick him out of here several times,” quipped Dr. Jack Miller, the oldest of the four Miller children and now on the Miller hospital staff. More seriously, the oldest son continued, “He had several reasons for not retiring earlier, however. He has so many friends and patients who depend on him and he always wanted them to know that he was available if nobody else was. He gets more calls at home than any of us—and he has felt obligated to be available when people needed him.”

Wide Clientele

And the people have needed him. During his years at the East Nashville hospital, which has a clientele from the entire city, he has also been personal physician to the football teams and band of Isaac Litton High School, Nashville Business College professional basketball team, Al Menah Shrine Temple and numerous Grand Old Opry stars, including the King of Country Music, Roy Acuff.

The other Miller son, Jimmy, who is administrator of the hospital and clinic, spoke of his father’s deep religious convictions as well as his dedication as a doctor. “He is a Christian”, said Dr. Miller’s youngest son.

“I wish I was more like him. I have never in my life seen him smoke or take a drink of alcohol and never heard him say a profane word—and I am 39 years old.”

During the years since he graduated from Vanderbilt University School of Medicine in 1927, Dr. Cleo Miller has contributed much more to the city of Nashville than his first class services as a surgeon and physician.

He was a sports enthusiast and supporter even before the days he was captain of the Vanderbilt baseball team in 1927.

His friends and family remember that he “worked like a dog” to keep professional baseball in Nashville and at one time was president of Vols, Inc., Nashville’s community owned ball club that fielded the last professional baseball team in the city. In 1963, he brought Lyndon B. Johnson, then vice president of the United States, to Nashville to throw out the season’s first baseball.

Ellington Tribute

Also an avid hunter and fisherman and a worker with youth, Dr. Miller on one occasion received a tribute from former Gov. Buford Ellington as “a doctor, a fairly good bird hunter, a baseball fan, and a man interested in young people.”

And the young people of the city—especially in East Nashville—call Dr. Miller their friend.

Through the years, he has made many trips with the ball teams and bands of both East Nashville and Litton High Schools, accompanying the Litton Band to its memorable performance in the Rose Bowl Parade in Pasadena in 1964, and always without pay.

A member of the Litton Men’s Club, he also was instrumental in establishing the Men’s Club scholarships which go to deserving Litton seniors each year.

As team physician, he has traveled extensively with the Nashville Business College basketball team, including a trip to Russia in 1965, and also has accompanied the members of Al Menah Shrine Temple on trips across the United States and to other countries.

“The longest referral of a patient that we ever got at Miller Hospital was when dad sent a Nashville woman home from Rome, Italy, after she was injured while accompanying her husband on a Shrine trip,” said Dr. Jack Miller.

Almost Missed

And an interesting part of Dr. Cleo Miller’s career is that on two occasions, he almost didn’t become a doctor at all. The first time was when he almost didn’t get into Vanderbilt Medical School because he had forgotten

to send in the \$25 advance deposit. The second time was when he was made very attractive offers by several professional baseball teams, including the Washington Senators, to go with them as a player.

“I have always admired Dad for the way he could handle so many things at one time,” said Dr. Jack Miller. Among his dad’s many accomplishments, “he was one of the best batting practice pitchers I ever saw.”

Both of Dr. Miller’s sons are athletes, and they also headed Vanderbilt’s baseball teams, Jack in 1953 and Jimmy in 1954. Dr. Miller’s older son said a team he played on in the Nashville City League in the early 1950s won the city championship largely because “Dad frequently pitched batting practice for us.” Active in Boy Scout work, Dr. Miller practices what the Scouts preach – a solid belief in God and country.



When he was named “Man of the Year in 1965 by the East Nashville Exchange Club, he was cited as a man who was very active in everything that pertains to our Constitution and our belief in God.

Dr. Miller has served his country in the military two different times. He did his internship with the U.S. Marines at Letterman General Hospital in San Francisco in 1927 before coming back to Nashville for his residency in surgery at General Hospital.

He volunteered for military service in June 1942, although he was over age, serving until September, 1945, because he ““wanted to do his duty to his country” in World War II, said his son, generally known as “Dr. Jack.”

During that time, while he was chief of surgery at Army base near New Haven Conn., he was instrumental in setting up a rapid convalescence program where patients were out of bed and walking soon after an operation, which has become standard procedure in all hospitals now.

Dr. Cleo Miller, who lives at 6202 Hickory Valley Road, is an elder in Westminster Presbyterian Church which the family has attended for many years. The Miller children fondly recall their nightly prayers around the family altar when they were growing up.

The family includes Mrs. Miller, the former Miss Kathryn Cotton, a native of Goodlettsville; and daughters Berenice (Mrs. Jimmy) Denton, and Jean Ann (Mrs. Mike) McNally, both of Nashville.

Dr. Miller's mother, Mrs. Aurora Hill, 90, lives at 710 North 12th St. His parents moved to Nashville in 1916 from Decherd where Dr. Miller was born, and his father, the late Joe Miller, was an automobile dealer here for several years.

Dr. Miller is a former president of the Nashville Academy of Medicine, and former president of the Federation of American Hospitals.

He is a member of the Nashville Surgical Society and American Board of Surgery, a Fellow in the American College of Surgeons and a past chapter chairman of the American Red Cross. A 32nd degree Mason, he is a member of Corinthian Lodge 414 F&AM. Records do not show how many babies Dr. Miller delivered from 1927 until he gave up his obstetrical practice in 1947.

"So many people who work here at the hospital were either delivered by Dad or their children were," said his eldest son.

"Dad has always treated people equally," Jimmy added. "He believes that a man is a man, not because of his title or position, but because he was created a man."


The **Dr. Cleo Miller House**, also known as **Ivy Hall**, is a historic mansion in Nashville. It was built in 1936 having been designed by Edwin Keeble in the Tudor Revival architectural style. It was the residence of Dr. Cleo Miller, a college friend of Keeble's at Vanderbilt University. The house has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since August 25, 1995.

Volkert Inducted in Metro Schools Sports Hall of Fame

In the spring of 2005, George Volkert (class of '53) was posthumously inducted into the Metro Nashville Public Schools Sports Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame program from the induction ceremony included the write-up below of this beloved Lion gridiron great.

George A. Volkert

*Litton High School
Class of 1953 - Inducted Posthumously*



George A. Volkert is remembered for his athletic ability which brought him success in several different sports. While a student at Isaac Litton High School, Volkert played football, basketball and ran track. He was an All-American football player in high school—a title he retained while playing football at Georgia Tech. Volkert, who lettered in football at Georgia Tech from 1953-1956, helped his team to four straight bowl game victories in the 1954 Sugar Bowl, 1955 Cotton Bowl, 1956 Sugar Bowl and the 1956 Gator Bowl. During this time, Volkert was a two-time All-Southeastern Conference selection and was named to the 1955 second team All-SEC by the Associated Press. In 1956, he served as captain of his Georgia Tech team.

"George was one of the most outstanding people I've ever been around," says his former coach, Herschel Moore. "He was a great person and also a great competitor. He only knew one speed and that was all-out."

After college, Volkert served in the Army Reserves. As a well-known developer, he was instrumental in planning the construction of Hickory Hollow Mall and Cool Springs Mall. He served as chairman of the Board of Trustees at Franklin Road Academy and helped build the school's athletic complex, which bears his name.

Volkert was married to Valerie Ippolito and had two daughters, Kristin and Camille. He had three granddaughters. In his free time, Volkert enjoyed playing golf and tennis.



James "Buzz" Cason (Class of 1957): An American Treasure

Alamo Jones of Sirius XM's Outlaw Country and others have called Buzz Cason the Father of Nashville rock. On his new Plowboy Records release Record Machine, Buzz takes the listener on a journey through the land of Americana. His previous albums have all charted and received heavy airplay on Sirius XM and Americana radio. In 2014, Buzz was honored by the Country Music Hall of Fame as part of their Poets & Prophets series. Buzz will be promoting the new record by touring solo and with his band The Love Notes. His performances are made up of his hits, the new songs, stories of past adventures and of course, a few jokes.

In a career spanning six decades, Buzz Cason has been living the rock & roll dream. He formed Nashville's first rock & roll band "The Casuals" in the mid-50s which became a successful touring act and Brenda Lee's backing band. He then started a solo career with the hit "Look for a Star" under the name Garry Miles.

Buzz is also a successful songwriter. His most well-known song is the classic "Everlasting Love" (co-written by MacGayden). Another one of Buzz's songs, "Soldier of Love" (co-written by Tony Moon), was recorded by Arthur Alexander and the Beatles. He also wrote a Country #1 for Tommy Overstreet ("Ann, Don't Go Runnin'") and hits for Mel Tillis, T.G. Shephard, the McCarters and many others.

Buzz produced Clifford Curry ("She Shot a Hole In My Soul"), Van & Titus ("Cry Baby Cry") and Jimmy Buffett's albums "Down to Earth" and "High Cumberland Jubilee" for which he also co-wrote several songs.

In the 21st century, Buzz has released a string of critically acclaimed American albums of original material including Troubadour Heart (2014) and Record Machine (2015) on Plowboy Records.

- Buzz is the only songwriter credited with cuts by the Beatles, Pearl Jam and U2
- Buzz was the voice of Alvin of the Chipmunks
- Buzz sang backup with Elvis Presley, Willie Nelson, Kris Kristofferson, John Denver, Kenny Rogers, Jimmy Buffett, Roy Orbison, George Jones, Leon Russell and many more
- Buzz is a member of the Rockabilly Hall of Fame
- Buzz produced Buddy Holly's former band The Crickets and toured England as their singer
- "Everlasting Love" charted in every decade since it was written
- Buzz is the only living musician who worked with all the major Sun Records artists

Blast From The Past

Below are reprinted articles which appeared in the Blast during the 1945-46 school year. Enjoy.

From September 21, 1945: Penalty System Explained

Instead of having each student who is given a ticket remain after school, each is given a ticket and after having received a certain number he is called to the office and his parents are asked to come to school to consult with the pupil, home room teacher and the principal. This system, called the Major and Minor System, has been in effect for the past two years and has proved to be very successful.

The following list includes the penalties for which a major or a minor can be given:

1. Leaving paper or bottles on tables in the cafeteria – 1 minor.
2. Disorderly behavior in lunchroom line – 1 minor.
3. Disturbing study hall – 1 minor.
4. Disturbing chapel – 1 minor.
5. Disturbing library – 1 minor.
6. Leaving study hall without permission – 1 minor.
7. Being late to class – 1 minor.
8. Smoking on pike between Vester's and Maplewood Lane – 1 minor.
9. Sitting in cars on school property – 1 minor.
10. Using wrong stairway – 1 minor
11. Failure to return report cards within three days – 1 minor.
12. Failing to bring excuse after absence – 1 minor.
13. Cutting chapel – 1 major.
14. Eating on campus – 1 major.
15. Cutting class – 1 major.
16. Forging signature on excuse – 1 major.
17. Smoking on school property – suspension.
18. Gambling – suspension.
19. Destroying school property – suspension.
20. For repetition of an offense within the same period, the penalty is one major.

When five minors are received for one or more of the above penalties, a student is given a major and the parents are asked to come and consult with the principal.

When two majors are received there is a conference with the students, the homeroom teacher and the principal.

When three majors are given the student is suspended for three days and receives a zero in each subject each day, thus making it almost impossible to pass any subject that month.

When four majors are received the student is suspended and not allowed to reenter Litton.

Monitors who disobey these rules are given demerits. After receiving a certain number of demerits, they will no longer be a monitor.


For three years he has been the football and basketball coach at Litton. He has worked faithfully to lead our teams to victory, and though there has not always been victory, there has been excellent playing.

MERCHANDISE COMMITTEE (MC)

The purpose of the Community Outreach Committee is to seek ways we can assist other organizations within the community in efforts to benefit the children of the community as a whole. This committee will serve as the liaison between the Board and any organization we serve.

The COC will proactively engage within the community, particularly to the Isaac Litton Middle School administration and the Inglewood Neighborhood Assoc. or any other organization that we support the needs of children such as the Backfield in Motion (BIM) to determine projects and/or funding needed to benefit the children of the community and the community as a whole.

MEMORABILIA/LIONS DEN (MLD):

To collect and organize items of interest and memorabilia pertaining to the history and legacy of Isaac Litton High School; to provide historic insight to those interested in our heritage and role in the community over the years.

When items are brought to the Lion's Den by alumni or families of alumni (or any other source), the items will be sorted and displayed. Displays are labeled, kept clean and organized. At such times as the Lion's Den is open to the public, it will be the function of one or more of the members of the MLD Committee to be available to answer any questions or provide assistance to those visiting.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE (CC):

The purpose of the CC is to ensure that all communications from the ILAA are clear, concise, and professional, being distributed accordingly in a timely manner, including quarterly publication of the BLAST.

When ANY written communication is necessary (or desirable) from any committee, for distribution to all board members, class representatives, alumni or to the public in general, that request is voted on by the Board and if approved, the Communications Committee will commence collecting data needed and preparing the communication for distribution.

CLASS REPRESENTATIVES/ MEMBERSHIPS (CRC):

The purpose of the Class Reps Committee (CRC) is to ensure that the most current information for all alumni is available for distribution or other use as needed, as well as to help direct Class Reps the best and most professional way to communicate with their classmates.

Class Reps will be responsible for: Keeping up with all current classmate information---names, addresses, phone numbers, email addresses; etc.--as changes occur. Updated information will be forwarded to the Chairperson of the Class Representatives Committee, who will expediently update all class records.

FUNDRAISING/EVENTS COMMITTEE (FEC):

To lead the board in efforts that attract money and services needed to carry out the mission of the organization.

Members of the FEC will work with the Board to define the short-term and long-term funding needs of the ILAA. It will be the responsibility of members of the FEC to plan funding activities, review the funding plan to ensure progress toward annual and long-range funding goals, encourage others to contribute financial support, identify and recruit community leaders to serve with board members on fundraising committees and to encourage the participation of the full board in fundraising.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE (NC):

To nominate a Board for each term who will support and actively participate in ILAA Board meetings, activities, and serve on various committees, as stated in the By-laws and to present these names to the Board for vote and approval resulting in the election the officers who will serve for the upcoming term in the following positions:

- Past-President
- President
- President-Elect
- Secretary
- Treasurer
- Board Member

GROUPS/FACILITY COMMITTEE (GFC):

To insure that the building and grounds are maintained in a suitable condition for the intended purposes. To assure that the building, use, maintenance, scheduling and security are thoroughly maintained and communicated to all concerned parties. To make periodic inspections of the gym and Duke Building and report conditions and needs for the upkeep of both buildings. Assure that the reserved events are current

and sufficient information is provided to the users of the facility; and they are fully aware of the rules and regulations for the building use. Schedule periodic meetings with the long term occupiers of the facility to assure adequate communications are provided. Assure that the facility is kept clean and secure.

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR COMMITTEE (AYC):

The criteria for selection of the Alumnus of the Year include but are not limited to any one or a combination of the following:

- Distinguished achievement in their respective field
- Loyalty to the ideals of Isaac Litton
- Distinguished leadership
- Positive representation of Isaac Litton
- Service to Isaac Litton
- Service to their community

The AYC will review the nominations and make their selection for the Alumnus of the Year, announced at our annual All-Alumni Banquet.
