SPOTLIGHT ON ALUMNI

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR 2021: MICKEY COLLIER

At the all-alumni banquet at Blue Grass Country Club on November 13, it was announced that Michael Wayne (Mickey) Collier, class of 1965, has been named the 2020-2021 Alumnus of the Year.

Mickey grew up on Cardinal Drive in Inglewood. At Litton, he played trumpet in the famous Marching 100 Band and marched during half-time at Litton's football games. He was among those who marched with the band at the 1964 Rose Bowl parade in California; the International Lions Club Convention parade in Florida; and the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade in New York City. He also played baseball in the Babe Ruth League managed by Chief Joe Casey.

Mickey graduated from Litton in 1965, then attended Memphis State College for two years; then joined the Navy, with basic training in Pensacola and Chicago. He also played softball when in the Navy. In 1968 while stationed in the Philippines, he met his wife, Patricia (Pat). "She took my breath away at first sight," he says. They've now been married for over 53 years and have a daughter, Teble; a son, Mike; and three grown grandsons, all of whom live in Hendersonville, TN, not far from Mickey and Pat.

After completing his Navy service, Mickey returned to Tennessee and went to work as a salesman for the Dictaphone Company for 35+ years, ultimately being made a District Manager and receiving several awards. After retiring from Dictaphone, he went to work for the Metro Nashville government as Maintenance Manager for the Metro Sportsplex. Retiring from that position in 2019, at his large retirement party, he was honored to receive a jersey signed by all the members of the Nashville Predators hockey team. He also received many other awards during his tenure with the Sportsplex.

One of Mickey's many great interests has been in vintage antique cars, and he owns two: a 1978 Chevrolet truck and an all-original 1957 Chevrolet station wagon. He also has a 2005 Thunderbird and a 1959 Feathercraft boat. He has served as President of the Sumner County Vintage Car Club and participates in many car shows. A skilled craftsman, he enjoys restoring antiques and old furniture for both personal use and as gifts, and he and his wife go "antiquing" often. His father worked for the L&N Railroad, and in his den is a solid oak roll-top desk that belonged to his father which Mickey restored to pristine condition. Also in his den among

many other antiques is an original Philco console radio which he painstakingly brought back to life. Other projects have included the refinishing of the metal 1950s cabinets in his wife's craft room, where she does crocheting, painting, and jewelry making. Mickey and Pat are also active supporters of the Sumner County Humane Association and give time and money to numerous local charities as well, such as HomeBound Meals and Home Safe. They donate to local food and clothing drives and give tirelessly of their time and talents to neighbors, friends and the community.



After joining the ILAA Board, Mickey was named President and served from 2018 through 2020. Under his tenure and direction, extensive renovation and upgrading of the Alumni Hall building and grounds took place. Damages caused by heavy rains that had flooded the Lions Hall and Lion's Den were given special attention. Ceiling tiles, carpet and baseboards were replaced. Roof repairs were made. Solar lighting around the outside marquee was installed and a new flag was hung above the Memorial Wall. A secure railing was put up at one of the building's entrances. The outside elevator was upgraded. Outside drainage issues were undertaken. All Class composite photographs in the Lions Hall were repaired and cleaned. Special cabinets were built and installed for storing surplus materials. Mickey obtained and maintained special items for display in the memorabilia room---the Lion's Den---tasks that he continues with the help

of his wife, Pat. He established significant working relationships with Metro government departments and employees regarding the building's upkeep, and still makes regular trips to Litton property to ensure that it is safe and being properly maintained. He is in close contact with the staffs of two of the programs which the ILAA supports: the Isaac Litton Middle School, and the non-profit program, Backfield In Motion (BIM), which provides after-school tutoring and meals for at-risk inner-city youth. For example, the Lions Hall now has WiFi connections for the BIM boys' tutoring use.

One wonders, though. Where does Mickey find the time? Where does he get all his energy? And, most of all: WHEN does he ever sleep???

The Isaac Litton Alumni Association is proud to add Mickey Collier to its list of Alumni of the Year recipients. His skills and talents have helped ILAA secure that the Isaac Litton High School leaves a lasting, meaningful legacy to its alumni and to the community. "Lions, Forever!" is not just a slogan; it has become a reality.







Litton: STEAM Education Connects Students to Real World

[Isaac Litton Middle](#) evolved from Isaac Litton Junior High and Jere Baxter Junior High. The site was named after the grandfather of Judge Litton Hickman, the then-presiding judge of Hickman County.

Litton is a STEAM-themed school in East Nashville that allows students to connect their classroom learning to the real world. The theme is supported by curriculum, partnerships, hands-on work, and technology — every classroom is equipped with interactive smartboards.



The building itself is a STEAM lesson. It is a LEED-certified, green building with double-pane windows, motion-sensor lights and plumbing, and climate-controlled classrooms throughout the school. Students can participate in events and programs like career fairs, the Rocket STEAM program — which, thanks to a Toshiba America Foundation Grant, lets students learn about rockets, force, and motions — and digital photography, a club sponsored by the Brentwood Photography Group. The school also has an extensive band program that includes beginner, intermediate, rock, pep, and honors bands. Students can choose their skill level and music interest.

ILMS' mascot is a lion, and their colors are red and blue. The school motto is "Moving full STEAM ahead with P.R.I.D.E.," which stands for Prepared, Reflective, Innovative, Data-driven, Engaged. ILMS is committed to giving each student a personalized experience through which they are exposed to real-world opportunities, and their identities, interests, and talents are cultivated.



The first year of operation in the junior high was September 1954 with the ninth graders (freshmen) being in the new building. Marshall Foster was principal of the senior building and

THE 1960 STATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS

I began attending Litton football games in the fall of 1958 when I was only 7 years old. I quickly acquired the pride that all red, white and blue clad Lions possessed. What a spectacle Friday nights were at our grand old school! Great teams. Huge, confetti covered crowds. The best band in the land. Yes, Football Friday nights at Isaac Litton's Hume Marshall Field had something for everyone.

There were high expectations for the Lions entering the season. But as always, the Lions faced a tough schedule. Year in and year out, Litton played one of the toughest schedules in the state. Could they make it to the Clinic Bowl as the '58 team did? Time would tell.

The Big Blue opened the season with a 42-7 win over Cookeville led by halfback Richard Cutrer. He was doubtful before the game with a back injury, but it did not slow him down.

The next game was against Memphis Central. First play of the game saw Don Hudson race 86 yards for a touchdown. Ronnie Reed and Butch Shaw led the defense by stuffing Central 3 times inside the Lions 35 yard line.

Next up was the huge neighborhood rivalry game with Madison. The Rams scored first but it was not to be their night. Cutrer and Jack Patterson led the victory for the Big Blue, both scoring TDs while QB Joe Young got the other one.

The annual game with Springfield was the next contest. The Yellow Jackets were always tough, but this night belonged to the Lions. All the scoring took place in the first half with Litton leading 13-0. The first TD took place after a 28 yard pass from QB Don Hudson to Cutrer. On the next play, Cutrer raced around left end to hit paydirt. He followed that by kicking the extra point. The Lion defense held up for its first shutout of the season.

In 1960, Litton was in the AAAA division, which was called the Big Four. Along with the Big Blue in AAAA were Hillsboro, MBA and Ryan. The winner of this division would go to the Clinic Bowl. So Litton's next opponent was Hillsboro for the all-important divisional game. The game started slowly for the Lions as they trailed 9-0 at halftime. The defense carried the Lions after that and the good-guys won 13-11. The Lion defenders held the Burros to 57 yards on the ground compared to 200 yards for the blue clad Lions.

Billy Tomlinson made his presence known in the next game as the Lions faced the Goodlettsville Trojans. Tomlinson raced 80 yards with the opening kickoff and Litton never looked back. Tomlinson scored 2 more times as the Lions won 31-0. Litton had 308 yards rushing for the game.

Another neighborhood rivalry kicked off the next week against the East Eagles. The Lions running game continued to churn out the yardage, gaining 362 yards. Richard Cutrer raced 76 for the first TD. Tony Daniels and Joe Young each added 1 touchdown, while Jack Patterson had 2. Final score: Litton 32-East 0.

Then came the pre-Halloween game with MBA. Football games between the Big Red and the Big Blue were legendary in Nashville during the 40s, 50s, and 60s. This one belonged to the Big Blue. Litton prevailed 19-6, setting up a showdown with Ryan for the Big Four Championship.

Ryan was the defending Big Four champion. The winner of this game would go to the Clinic Bowl. Litton's first TD was set up by the running of halfbacks Tony Daniels and Billy Tomlinson. Bruising fullback Jack Patterson bowled over the goal line from 2 yards out. Then, Billy Matthes recovered an Irish fumble at Ryan's 30 yard line. This set up another Lion touchdown run by Tomlinson. The Lions feasted on the Irish for a 13-0 victory. Litton was Clinic Bowl bound.




Lions whoop it up in the dressing room after the first undefeated season.

The last game of the season provided the Lions a chance for its first perfect season in history. The DuPont Bulldogs came barking onto Hume Marshall field but left with its tail between its legs. DuPont was no match as the Lions roared 41-0. Jack Patterson gained 110 yards on 10 carries and scored 3 times as the Big Blue finished the season 10-0, with 5 shutouts and only 6 TDs scored against them all season.

The Associated Press named Isaac Litton the state champions. The Lions' stable of running backs Richard Cutrer, Jack Patterson, Billy Tomlinson and Tony Daniels received lots of publicity and a few awards. However, a team doesn't win with running backs alone. Linemen Butch Shaw and Don Filson were named to the All-State team. Receiving All-City honors were linemen, Sandy Baggot, Ronnie Reed and Billy Matthes. In short, this Lion team was loaded.

Of course, there was 1 game remaining...the Clinic Bowl on Thanksgiving Day. The Tennessean reported that 28,000 fans filed into Dudley Field, the largest crowd to ever witness a high school football game in this state. Litton was matched up with Battle Ground Academy on a beautiful day for football. As a 9 year old, I had never heard of BGA, but they too were undefeated. I found out later that they too were loaded. After fumbling the ball 5 times, the Lions were never really in it, losing 13-0.

Coach Bill Harris deserved better. I thought he never received the credit and publicity he deserved. He was a great coach and his players gave their all for him. The Clinic Bowl loss was to be his last game as the Litton coach. He decided to go into administration and I was crushed. How could he leave the best high school around?

Many years later, I had the chance to meet BGA's legendary Coach Brown. I introduced myself as a broken hearted 9 year-old in 1960 when he beat Litton. He told me what Coach Harris said to him after the Clinic Bowl loss: "I tried to tell them what a good team you had. I tried to tell them."

Through those first 3 years of being a young fan of Isaac Litton football, the Big Blue only lost 4 games. I felt so blessed to live in Inglewood and be a part of the history of one of the best high schools in the state. I felt bad for children living in other parts of Nashville because they could never experience what the Inglewood community did. Those 3 years still live within me, as do those gridiron greats who played for the Lions. To them I say "Thank You" for making wonderful memories for me. You were a great inspiration to so many of us kids. Simply put, you were my heroes.
