The mayor is a Nashville native and already knew about our band's fame.


Our connections with Nashville government officials are critical to our continued ability to carry out our mission to keep Litton's history alive and serve our community in its name.

ILAA Scholarship Award

The ILAA Board established a Scholarship Committee in the fall of 2024. Many thanks to the committee members: Judy Cline, Franklin Davis, Buddy Jones, Rita Solomon and Sammy Swor for their participation. The Committee evaluated other alumni scholarship processes and developed a prototype for our first annual scholarship award to include high school seniors and undergraduate students who have been academically diligent and are direct descendants of Isaac Litton High School graduates. In



addition to the application, the students are required to have a recommendation from the principal or student advisor and to participate in an interview. At our Scholarship Committee interview, Libby Collier stated she planned to continue her serving role this summer to save money for college and plans an internship next summer. We asked about her most challenging issue. She stated that it is time management and prioritizing projects, but she gets it done. We inquired about leadership roles; she is working with a team of eight students and has taken the initiative to coordinate a resort project with tiny homes and amenities. When asked what her response would be if another team member didn't pull their weight she suggested methods to encourage them to be a more effective team participant. She has helped in community service with an organization building homes, hammering frames together and then painting after drywall installation. **At the May meeting, the ILAA Board voted to approve Libby Collier, granddaughter of Larry and Sue Collier, (Class of '69) to receive the first ILAA Scholarship.**

Here is an excerpt from her scholarship application essay:

"Libby is a sophomore at the University of Tennessee, pursuing a degree in interior architecture. Her dream is to become an interior designer, a passion that has grown over the years. Since childhood, she has loved both playing and watching sports and comes from a family of dedicated Tennessee Titans and Vols fans.

Once admitted into the University of Tennessee's Interior Architecture department, she set clear goals to ensure academic success and professional growth. Her educational aspirations include maintaining strong academic performance, striving for straight A's or A's and B's, and giving her best effort on every assignment. She is dedicated to working hard to graduate and to develop the skills necessary to excel in her chosen field. Her career ambitions involve working at Hannah Homes in

Hendersonville, Tennessee, where the interior designer collaborates with diverse clients to integrate their personal styles into modern and minimalistic designs. She has a deep passion for designing spaces that families will call home, and since this firm specializes in residential projects, it is the perfect place to begin. She applied for this scholarship because financial support is crucial to continuing education and career goals. Coming from a low-income household, she must rely on numerous student loans to afford her education at UT. Receiving this scholarship would provide significant relief by helping to cover tuition costs and reduce the financial burden. Each semester, she is responsible for paying half of her tuition and needs to reimburse parents and grandparents for their contributions. This scholarship would ease that responsibility and allow her to focus more on studies and career preparation rather than financial stress.

She is a current member of the IA Collaborative Club at the University of Tennessee, which is the student organization for the American Society of Interior Designers (ASID) and the International Interior Design Association (IIDA). Its goals are to give students studying interior architecture opportunities for professional growth and to create a welcoming environment that promotes information sharing. This organization often hosts activities that let members apply principles learned in the classroom to real-world situations, like portfolio evaluations, panel discussions, company tours, and design competitions. Through these activities, she is exposed to norms and laws, environmental practices, contemporary design trends, and teamwork that is typical in the workplace. In conclusion, she is committed to achieving academic and career goals, and this scholarship would play a vital role in helping her reach them. By lightening the financial strain and acknowledging her achievements, this support would allow her to continue excelling in her studies and ultimately pursue her dream of becoming a successful interior designer.”

Congratulations to Libby, her parents Curt and Holly Collier, her brother, and her grandparents, who were all able to attend our All Alumni Banquet!






Judy Butler Cline, Class of '70 Alumnus of the Year for 2025!

She is a devoted wife, mother, and professional whose life has been marked by unwavering faith, service, and a passion for helping others thrive. Raised in Tennessee, she attended Bailey and Jere Baxter Elementary before graduating from Isaac Litton in 1970. She earned her degree in marketing from Middle Tennessee State University in 1974, later adding a master's degree in Christian counseling to her accomplishments.



In 1969, she met the love of her life, Jim, a fellow MTSU graduate. After four years of dating, they married—and are now celebrating 52 years together. They have two sons, Andy (married to Sara Beth) and Wes (married to Molly), and are proud grandparents to seven grandchildren.

A lifelong learner and leader, she built a successful career in human resources at companies including Aladdin Industries, Datrek, Kusan, and Caterpillar. She currently serves as a Chaplain for Nashville Rescue Mission and has held leadership positions on the boards of the American Red Cross and several civic and workforce development initiatives. She also co-founded The BenchMark Group, an executive outplacement company, later sold to Lee Hecht Harrison.

Certified as a Six Sigma Master Black Belt, she is a process improvement expert trained to manage complex projects that reduce waste and increase efficiency.


Please take some time to explore the website. As mentioned, the content is



I saw your post on Facebook and memories of Litton are pretty foggy at my age. I was a member of the ill-fated class of 1972. After our junior year, our class was cast to the four winds. I went to four schools in four years: Litton, Madison, Volunteer State Community College and UT Knoxville. The one constant for me was playing my trumpet at all those schools, including four years in the Pride of the Southland Band. Sammy Swor was a great teacher of marching, and his eventual successor was John T. Wade.

This military man brought us the discipline we needed in the post-Swor era. Mr. Wade also assured me that he would have made sure I could have joined him in the National Guard band in Middle Tennessee. A high draft number directed me toward my current path, so I stayed non-military. Band rehearsals are serious business, and I learned much of that self-control at Isaac Litton. Mr. Wade was a huge part of that experience. I think he continued his band director journey at Stratford High School because I saw several pictures of him on Facebook from 2022.

I continue to be a band geek playing with the UT Alumni Band at the fall homecoming games with the full band and helping with the pep bands for the Lady Vols and men's basketball teams during the holidays. I still play the Getzen Severinsen model trumpet my parents bought for me while I was at Litton. I got to meet Doc Severinsen in 2019, and he told me never to sell it. All of this might not have happened if John T Wade had not come to Isaac Litton High School.

Dad's drug store supported the teams. He was a 1942 grad. The composite picture of our class they did really tore me up at our 50th reunion. Rita Solomon who headed that up is a kind soul. Hard for me to be active living here in Knoxville.

The UT band made me a member of the WJ Julian society a couple of years ago. The UT band is in our will. It's still a thrill to play at Neyland or at the Food City Center. Here is a photo of Doc Severinsen and me made in 2019 at the 150th anniversary of the Pride of the Southland Band. Doc was 97 in this photo.

There are fewer of us now in my class, '72, but I hope my story brings back fond memories to my former band members of the Marching 100+ at Isaac Litton High School. **Litton High Forever!**
